The Jolly Beach Hotel is a key pillar in Antigua and Barbuda's tourism industry

The Jolly Beach Hotel, a proposal for which is being considered to transfer its ownership to the Social Security Scheme, is currently performing an important role in the overall tourism product of the country.

Tourism Minister Charles Max Fernandez told the debate on the proposal in the House of Representatives on Monday, that the Jolly Beach Hotel's value to the tourism sector is quite significant.

For example, the minister said the property is one of only two properties that currently cater to the family segment of the market. Additionally, because it is largely seen as an 'affordable' property, it provides a demand for economy seats on the airlines, thus increasing demand for additional

airlifts.

"There is now an increased demand for this type of property in our tourism product. As a matter of fact, once when we toured the property, one guest approached the prime minister urging him to keep the Jolly Beach open because as a repeat guest, 'it was the only property available for middle income travelers like her'," the minister reported.

According to Fernandez, it is just as important to attract the high-end traveler who would usually fill the first or business class seats, as it is to fill 'the back of the planes' with travelers who want to stay at a middle-income-type-hotels such as Jolly Beach.

He disclosed that in 2023, Jolly Beach accounted for 23 percent of the visitors to the country. In 2024, the property generated \$21.84 million in revenues with an operating profit of \$4.35 million. As of May 31, 2025, the resort had generated revenue of \$13.31 million which is 6 percent more than for the same period of a year ago. Projected revenue for 2025 is \$23 million. There are approximately 200 employees at the hotel.

Currently, the Jolly Beach Hotel comprises of 27.2 acres of beach-front property; the total length of the white-sand beach in front of the. The hotel property is 1,650 feet; the average width of the white sand beach is 120 feet; approximate area of beach is 5.5 acres; there are 382 rooms, 318 of which are now operational with another 20 expected to become operational shortly; 18 suites will become oper-

ational in the fall; there are four restaurants (a buffet, pool bar and restaurant, a beach restaurant and a regular restaurant); it has a gym and a gift shop; and there are two pools that are now being refurbished.

The hotel currently has an occupancy 62 percent which is expected to rise following the planned renovations and which will drive further demands for rooms with the attendant airline flights especially in the summer months.

In its current state, the Jolly Beach is a major stop for nationals who spent time there on day-passes. In 2023, 1,383 nationals went there on day passes, in 2024 that amount rose to 2,396 and for the first six months of 2025 it totaled 1,726 persons.

The Hon. Daryll S. Matthew added: "This honor is long overdue. Burning Flames' contribution to Antigua and Barbuda's culture, coupled with

Antigua and Barbuda speaks loudly at pre-COP30 meeting in Mexico



Antigua and Barbuda delegation at Mexico meeting

Antigua and Barbuda participated in the Ministerial Meeting of Latin America and the Caribbean for the Implementation of Regional Climate Action, held on 25–26 August 2025 in Mexico City.

Ministers and representatives from the region convened to forge a united position ahead of COP30 in Belém, Brazil. The delegation of Antigua and Barbuda was led by Senator Michael

Joseph, Minister of State in the Ministry of Health, Wellness, Environment, and Civil Service Affairs, alongside Ambassador Ruleta Camacho Thomas.

During the plenary session, Minister Joseph emphasized that for Small Island Developing States (SIDS) like Antigua and Barbuda, the transition to low-carbon, resilient economies is an economy-wide challenge requiring transforma-

tive, non-debt-creating finance. He highlighted the importance of accountability from the world's largest emitters, noting that "rights without remedies are not justice."

The Antigua and Barbuda delegation also participated in a special session on sargassum, where innovative uses for sargassum biomass were demonstrated. While acknowledging the value of innovation, the delegation stressed the urgent need for sustainable management and financing for large-scale cleanup operations, given the mounting costs.

Minister Joseph and Ambassador Camacho used the opportunity to meet with Alicia Barcena-Minister of Environment and Natural Resources of Mexico and Andre Correa do Lago- President-Designate of the 2025 UN Climate Change Conference, COP30

Japan donates harvester for sargassum removal

The Japanese Government has donated another piece of equipment to the Antigua and Barbuda government to be utilized in the removal of sargassum seaweeds from the nation's coastline.

General Manager of the National Solid Waste Management Authority (NSWMA), Indira James Henry, said the equipment - a harvester – is

the final donation in a set of equipment for removal of the invasive seaweeds. Other equipment included booms that have been used for similar purposes.

The donation was made through the Japanese International Corporation Agency and technicians from the suppliers are currently in the country conducting training

session with members of the Coast Guard who are the ones who will operate the machine.

The training focuses not

only on the operation but also on the maintenance of the equipment as well. It will run over the course of a week.

James Henry said this is the time of the year when the sargassum seaweeds begin to taper off. The sargassum 'season' begins in late January or February and comes to an end around this time of the year.

She explained that the harvester is not likely to go into action before early next year unless there is a sudden spike in the arrival of the seaweeds over the coming weeks.

The NSWMA general manager noted that following

their removal from the shoreline, the plan is to store the seaweeds in a designated area where they will be allowed to decompose for use as fertilisers or even for export.

"We are looking at several options of what to do with the harvested seaweeds but we are not yet at a stage where there is a final definitive plan of action," she stated.

The harvester is said to be valued at over \$300-thousand.





Trinidad and Tobago's prime minister defends support for U.S. naval presence near Venezuela amid regional criticism

Prime Minister Kamla Persad-Bissessar has reiterated her government's firm support for the United States Navy's deployment near Venezuela, declaring that Trinidad and Tobago's foreign and domestic policy will be guided by a "Trinidad and Tobago first" approach for the next five years.

The Trump administration has framed the deployment as part of a counter-narcotics mission targeting Latin American drug cartels, particularly Venezuela's Tren de Aragua and Mexico's Sinaloa Cartel, which it accuses of fueling the fentanyl crisis in the U.S. White House officials have stated that the operation aims to intercept smuggling vessels, gather intelligence, and potentially conduct precision strikes against cartel-linked infrastructure. President Trump has designated several cartels as foreign terrorist organizations, opening the door to expanded military action under counter-terrorism

In a detailed statement to Guardian Media, Persad-Bissessar defended her position against criticism from regional leaders and opposition figures, emphasizing that the U.S. has the operational capacity to disrupt transnational drug and arms trafficking networks. She stated that cooperation with Washington is intended to protect—not undermine—the Caribbean region.

"There is no need for this



country to consult with Caricom on domestic issues," she said, citing the disproportionate impact of illegal migration, narcotics, and firearms from Venezuela on Trinidad and Tobago. She added, "Thousands of our citizens have been murdered in the last 25 years. Just yesterday, a 65-year-old retiree was raped, most likely by an illegal immigrant."

Persad-Bissessar dismissed claims that her stance had fractured Caricom's unity, noting that several member states aligned with the Bolivarian Alliance for the Peoples of Our America (ALBA)—including St Lucia, St Vincent, Grenada, and Dominica—had already expressed support for Venezuelan President Nicolás Maduro and condemned U.S. actions.

"Caricom unity had already been fractured before my comments," she said. "I make no apology for standing firm against narco-trafficking and gun smuggling. I make no apology for defending a Caricom neighbour, Guyana, who is under threat. And I make no apology for putting the interests

of Trinidad and Tobago first."

Her remarks drew sharp criticism from former prime minister Dr Keith Rowley, who described her warning to Venezuela over Guyana as "the most reckless foreign policy statement in years." Former foreign affairs minister Dr Amery Browne also accused her of "sabotaging" Caricom's ability to present a unified front.

Meanwhile, ALBA member states convened virtually for their 13th Extraordinary Summit, issuing a joint statement condemning what they described as "renewed aggression by the U.S. against Latin America and the Caribbean." The group reaffirmed its commitment to the 2014 CELAC Proclamation of Latin America and the Caribbean as a Zone of Peace and expressed full support for President Maduro.

ALBA leaders rejected U.S. accusations against Venezuela's government, calling them "groundless" and "mythomaniacal," and condemned the ongoing U.S. economic blockade

of Cuba. The alliance also backed a call from Colombia's president for an emergency meeting of regional foreign ministers to coordinate a sovereign response to perceived threats.

The Venezuelan government responded to the U.S. military deployment—which includes three US battleships carrying 4,500 personnel—as a destabilizing move. In its statement, Venezuela pledged a peaceful approach and emphasized its commitment to sovereignty and crime prevention without foreign interference.

President Maduro has mobilized over 4.5 million militia members in response, dismissing U.S. claims of drug trafficking through the so-called "Cartel of the Suns" and calling the American campaign a "desperate" attempt to justify intervention.

China also weighed in, with Foreign Ministry spokesperson Mao Ning stating that Beijing opposes any action that violates the UN Charter or threatens the sovereignty of other nations. China urged the U.S. to adopt measures that promote peace and stability in the region.

Russia has not issued a formal public statement on the deployment, but analysts note that the scale and proximity of U.S. forces near Venezuela raise the specter of confrontation with Moscow, which has historically supported the Maduro government. (Dominica News Online)

Pharmacy in the Caribbean poised for transformation, says outgoing Caribbean Association of Pharmacists president

It featured workshops, plenary sessions, and continuing education programs designed to empower pharmacists with evidence-based knowledge and tools to better serve their communities.

In a heartfelt moment, Datsing bid farewell to her presidency, thanking her executive team and corporate partners for their dedication and support. She credited her leadership journey to her roots in the Guyana Pharmacists Association, which she said "groomed me to take up this mantle and showed my capabilities to lead at a regional level."

The ceremony concluded with the formal introduction of CAP's new executive body for 2025–2027, led by incoming President Jorman L. Laureate of the Cayman Islands. Datsing passed the symbolic presidential medal to Laureate, expressing confidence in his leadership and the future of CAP.

Grange receives Port Royal World Heritage Site certificate



Culture Minister Olivia Grange is reporting that she today received the Certificate of Inscription classifying Port Royal as a World Heritage Site.

The Certificate of Inscription was presented to Grange by the Regional Director and Representative of the UNESCO Cluster Office of the Caribbean, Eric Falt.

"This is a big deal," Grange said.

"We are proud as the Min-

istry to have completed almost 40 years of our country's dream to have Port Royal inscribed. We have delivered," she added.

Port Royal was inscribed on the UNESCO World Heritage List on July 12, 2025.

This inscription to the World Heritage List confirms Port Royal's outstanding universal value which requires protection for the benefit of all humanity.

Grange said, "We are committed to preserving the heritage of Port Royal for the people of Port Royal, the wider Jamaica and the world."

Mr Falt said, "It is a tremendous pleasure to celebrate this very important development. The Port Royal story is one of wealth and disaster, mirroring the weight of the human experience."

He said that Port Royal was a place of global significance and that UNES-

CO would work with the Government to safeguard the Port Royal legacy.

Grange said Jamaica was thankful to the governments and people of Mexico, Netherlands, Canada and Japan for their support in developing and fostering the first underwater excavation led by a Jamaican team and to the "hard-working" technical team of the Ministry and its agency, the Jamaica National Heritage Trust. Southwest Airlines to charge plus-size travellers for extra seat



Southwest Airlines will soon require travellers who can't fit within the armrests of their seat to pay for an extra one in advance, part of a string of recent changes the carrier is making.

The new rule goes into effect January 27, the same day Southwest starts assigning seats.

Currently, plus-size passengers can either pay for an extra seat in advance with the option of getting that money back later, or they can request a free extra seat at the airport.

Under the carrier's new policy, a refund is still possible but no longer guaranteed.

In a statement Monday, Southwest said it is updating some of its policies as it prepares for assigned seating next year.

"To ensure space, we are communicating to Customers who have previously used the extra seat policy that they should purchase it at booking," the statement said.

It marks the latest change at Southwest, which had long been known for letting its passengers pick their own seats after boarding the plane, and for letting their bags fly for free, which ended in May.

Those perks were key to differentiating the budget carrier from its rivals.

Southwest says it will still refund a second ticket under its new policy for extra seating if there is at least one open seat on the flight when it departs, and if both of the passenger's tickets were purchased in the same booking class.

The passenger also needs to request the refund within 90 days of the flight.

If a passenger who needs an extra seat doesn't purchase one ahead of time, they will be required to buy one at the airport, according to the new policy.

If the flight is full, the passenger will be rebooked onto a new flight.

The airline has struggled recently and is under pressure from activist investors to boost profits and revenue.

It also said last year that it would charge customers extra for more legroom and offer red-eye flights. (Jamaica Gleaner)

Manhunt under way after two police officers shot dead in rural Australian town

A huge manhunt is under way for a "heavily armed" male suspect after two Australian police officers were shot dead and one injured in an ambush at a property in a small rural town in the state of Victoria.

Police described the situation in Porepunkah in the Australian Alps - some 300km (186 miles) north-east of Melbourne - as an "active incident" with hundreds of personnel deployed to find the suspect.

Officers were attacked as 10 of them attended the property to serve an arrest warrant, which Australian media said was for historical sex offences.

Police say the suspect escaped by running into the bush alone after the shooting. Officers are still trying to find the man's wife and children.

Victoria Police Chief Commissioner Mike Bush said that 10 officers went to the property on Tuesday at about 10:30 local time (00:30 GMT).

They were fired upon by a heavily armed offender, he said, adding that two colleagues - a 59-year-old detective and a 35-year-old senior constable - were "murdered in cold blood".

A third officer was shot in the lower body. He was airlifted to hospital and was undergoing surgery, Mr Bush said. His injuries are not life-threatening.

The state police chief said all the available resources were being used in the manhunt for a "dangerous" suspect, and urged locals to stay indoors.

"[Our] priority is to arrest him and bring safety and security to this community," the officer said.

He added that the suspect was believed to have been on his own at the time of the shooting, and that police "are still looking to locate his partner and two children, but he was not seen to head into the bush with them".

He said the fact that so many officers



were attending, highlighted that they knew the risks - and urged the gunman to give himself up.

The police chief did not confirm the nature of the raid that officers were executing at the property.

Footage from the scene earlier on Tuesday showed dozens of police deployed to Porepunkah and a police helicopter circling in the area.

The town, home to about 1,000 people, is part of the Alpine Shire local government area. People have been warned not to travel into the area.

In a statement, Mayor Sarah Nicholas paid tribute to the officers, extending "thoughts, love and unwavering" support to their families.

"Today has been a day of deep sorrow and shock for our community... We are grieving together," she said.

Australian Prime Minister Anthony Albanese and Victorian Premier Jacinta Allan both praised the officers for their bravery.

Local resident Emily White told the BBC she and her guests had been sheltering in a caravan park that she owned.

"I think reality really set in - that this is a really, really horrible situation," Ms White said.

"We're such a small community, and we'll leave our cars unlocked, and we'll leave our front doors open. Nothing like this ever happens."

Local media are naming the suspect as Dezi Freeman - who claims to be a "sovereign citizen" - which refers to someone who falsely believes they are not subject to Australian laws and government authority.

Called SovCits for short, these people have been a presence in the nation for decades, according to the Australian Federal Police (AFP).

The police say they are mostly harmless, but there has been a resurgence of the beliefs in recent years - in part fuelled by mistrust in authorities which was exacerbated by the Covid pandemic.

In a 2023 briefing note, the AFP said the movement had "an underlying capacity to inspire violence".

Gun crime is relatively rare in Australia, which has some of the world's strictest gun regulations.

But similarities are being drawn with an ambush attack in 2022, when two police officers were killed at a rural property in Queensland. (BBC)

Tropical Storm Juliette forms in Pacific as Fernand churns over open waters in the Atlantic

ropical Storm Juliette formed Monday in the Pacific Ocean hundreds of miles from Mexico's Baja California peninsula as Tropical Storm Fernand churned in the Atlantic Ocean.

No coastal watches or warnings were in effect for either storm, the Miami-based US National Hurricane Center said.

Juliette posed no immediate threat to land, forecasters said.


The storm was about 470 miles (760 kilometres) southwest of the southern tip of the Baja California peninsula. It had maximum sustained winds of 60 mph (95 kph) after strengthen during the day.

It was moving west-northwest at 14 mph (22 kph).

Forecasters said Juliette was expected to strengthen further in coming hours and had the potential to become a hurricane by Tuesday

In the Atlantic basin, Fernand formed Saturday but also was far from land and forecast to remain over open ocean waters.

On Monday afternoon, it



was about 485 miles (775 kilometres) east-northeast of Bermuda with maximum sustained winds of 60 mph (95 kph) and heading north-northeast at 14 mph

(22 kph).

The storm was expected to turn more to the northeast as it moves away from Bermuda. Forecasters said it would begin weakening and could become a post-tropical cyclone on Wednesday before dissipating Thursday. (AP)

Business football league to commence early next month

The 2025 JOMA Caribbean Ministry of Sports Business Football League Championship is set to commence on Saturday, September 6.

Thirty-four (34) teams, an increase of seven teams from last year, will battle for supremacy in this year's competition.

2024 champions Hermitage Hotel will be defending their title in the competition in which the 34 teams are divided into four groups to engage in round-robin pool play in the preliminary stage.

Hermitage Hotel is among eight teams that will compete in Group 4, which also includes 2023 champions APUA Telecoms. The other Group 4 teams are AP-CMOL, AS Bryden Green Acres, Immigration, Antigua and Barbuda Port Authority, and Civil Registry.

Eight teams will also contest Group 3, while the other two groups will each feature nine teams. Contesting Group 3 are CHAPA Warriors, General Post Office (GPO), Her Majesty's Prison (HMP) Oasis United, Antigua and Barbuda Airport Authority, ACE Trucking FC, SkyTiger Services, Keyonna Beach Hotel, and Royalton Chic Hotel.

Group 2 will feature last year's second-place finishers, Ministry of Agriculture, along with Hodges Bay Resort, JH Stingers, University of the West Indies Five Islands Campus (UWIFIC), Sir Vivian Richards Stadium, Macky Enterprise, the Ministry of Tourism, Fresh Acres, and Central Marketing Corporation (CMC).

Group 1 includes last year's third-place finishers Sandals, along with Royalton Strikers, St. John's Development Corporation (SJDC), Blue Waters, Galley Bay Ballers, APUA Head Office, Public Works Asphalt, and newcomers Automotive Art and National Housing.

Matches in this year's competition will be played at five venues. They are Radio Ranger in Ottos,

Keithley Sheppard Recreational Park (formerly King George V Recreational Park), Golden Grove, Jennings, and St. Johnstone's Village Stadium.

Hermitage Hotel won their maiden title by prevailing 4-2 against the Ministry of Agriculture in a penalty shootout after both teams battled to a goalless draw in regulation during the final at the Antigua Recreation Grounds (ARG) last December.

Last year's losing finalists, Sandals Resort, captured third place via default after DEWS Pro Builders failed to show up for their encounter in the playoff for the bronze medals.

Venus' return means more to her than a US Open loss

NEW YORK (AP) — That Venus Williams lost her first Grand Slam match in two years — and what she says will be her last match of 2025 — didn't really matter Monday night.

Certainly not to the thousands of supportive spectators in the Arthur Ashe Stadium seats who roared for her best shots and, in a way, for everything her career means to them, before sending her off the court with a standing ovation after a 6-3, 2-6, 6-1 defeat against 11th-seeded Karolina Muchova of the Czech Republic at the US Open.

The result also sure seemed beside the point to Williams herself, at 45

the oldest singles player at Flushing Meadows since 1981. She smiled and laughed and joked through her post-match news conference — until, that is, a reporter asked something that made her think back to all of the injury and illness issues she dealt with for years.

"Oh, what did I prove to myself?" Williams began, repeating part of the question. "I think for me, getting back on the court was about giving myself a chance to play more healthy. When you play unhealthy, it's in your mind. It's not just how you feel. You get stuck in your mind too. So it was nice to

be freer."

As she spoke those last few words, Williams bowed her head and closed her eyes, which welled with tears. After several seconds of silence, the tournament moderator ended the Q-and-A session and Williams rose from her seat at the front of the room.

This was just the fourth singles match of a comeback that began in July after 16 months off the tennis tour, time marked by pain from uterine fibroids she had surgery for last year.

"My team and I, we worked as hard and as fast as we could. We literally took no days off. I haven't gone to dinner. I haven't seen friends. I haven't done anything except train for three months as hard as I could," Williams said. "From each match that I didn't win, then I tried to go back and learn from that and then get better."

She hasn't won a match at the US Open in singles since 2019, when she got to the second round. Since then, Williams exited in the first round in 2020, 2022 and 2023, and missed the tournament in 2021 and 2024.

Being back in the arena meant so much to her — and to those watching. This event holds a special place in her career. Her first Grand Slam final came at the 1997 US Open, when she was 17. She won two of her seven major championships there, in 2000 and 2001.

And it was at the US Open more than a decade ago that Williams withdrew before she was supposed to play in the second round, revealing she had been diagnosed with Sjögren's syndrome, an energy-sapping auto-immune disease that can cause joint pain.

Some thought she might leave tennis because of that, but she remained a leading figure — on and off the court.

Slot hails Liverpool's mentality after win at Newcastle

LIVERPOOL (Reuters) - Liverpool manager Arne Slot praised his players' mental fortitude after their 3-2 victory at Newcastle United on Monday, saying his team had shown the kind of mentality needed to get results in difficult places.

With the match unfolding in the shadow of Newcastle's dispute with striker Alexander Isak, who was reportedly the subject of a 110 million pounds (\$148.60 million) bid from Liverpool this month, the Premier League champions endured a roller-coaster evening at a white-hot St. James' Park.

Liverpool squandered a two-goal lead against a Newcastle side reduced to 10 men following Anthony Gordon's first-half red card, but were rescued by a 100th-minute winner from 16-year-old Rio Ngumoha.

"Winning away at Newcastle then you definitely need to have quality, especially in an atmosphere like this," the Dutchman told reporters.

"Not football quality because that's not what we showed today — apart from the last goal we scored.

"That looked a little bit like what I see on a daily basis on the training ground. But to have the mentality to fight here in such a hostile stadium, that is definitely something you also need if you want to compete in the end.

"Winning is something else but at least competing you definitely need to have this mentality — and that's what we showed."

Meanwhile, Gordon has apologised to his teammates and supporters after being sent off in their Premier League defeat by Liverpool. Gordon was sent off in first-half stoppage time for a rash tackle that left stud marks on the back of Liverpool captain Virgil van Dijk's calf — his initial yellow card being upgraded to a red by referee Simon Hooper.

"I want to sincerely apologise to my teammates and the fans," Gordon posted on social media. "My intentions were pure. I was just trying to create energy in the game and I mistimed the tackle."

The 24-year-old England international also apologised to Van Dijk.

"I would never intend to tackle somebody like this on purpose. We spoke after and he knows that," the former Everton winger added.

Newcastle next visit Leeds United on Saturday, while Liverpool will host Arsenal at Anfield on Sunday.

New Zealand cricket team hit by slew of injuries

HAMILTON (Reuters) - New Zealand have been hit by a rash of injuries ahead of their home summer with Will O'Rourke out for at least three months, white-ball skipper Mitch Santner undergoing surgery, and Glenn Phillips and Finn Allen both facing spells on the sidelines.

O'Rourke, who suffered a stress fracture in his back against Zimbabwe earlier this month, will miss next month's Twenty20 clashes with Australia as well as short-format series against England and West Indies in October and November.

Santner, who is set to have abdominal surgery, was described as "touch and go" to face the Australians in the three T20s in Tauranga but all-rounder Phillips will definitely miss the series as he continues to recover from a groin injury.

Opening batsman Allen will also be sidelined for three months after having surgery on his right foot.

"We're really feeling for Will at the moment and wishing him speedy recovery," New Zealand coach Rob Walter said in a news release.

"He's had such an impressive start to his career and so naturally it is disappointing when an injury like this comes along, but he's a resilient guy and determined to put the work in and come back stronger.

"It's disappointing to lose the services of Glenn and Finn who have played important batting roles in our T20 set up in recent time," he added.

Walter said he would give spin-

ner Santner, who sustained his injury while playing in The Hundred in England, every opportunity to prove his fitness to face Australia in the Chappell-Hadlee series in early October.

"Mitch is a world class player and a crucial part of our T20 side from a skills and leadership point of view," he said.

"With that in mind we expect to

name him in our squad when we announce it in a couple of weeks' time, and from there we can assess how his rest and rehabilitation progresses following surgery, before making a call on the eve of the series."

New Zealand will also play the West Indies in a three-match home Test series in late November and early December.

Antiguans remain unbeaten at ECCB International Netball Series

After securing a 65-43 victory against the Commonwealth of Dominica in their opening day encounter, host Grenada suffered their first loss in a 60-68 defeat against guest team Barbados.

The Commonwealth of Dominica suffered their second loss in as many games with a 47-53 defeat against St. Lucia, whose opening game against Montserrat was stopped by rain.

After their opening game against Guyana was stopped due to rain, defending champions St. Vincent and the Grenadines claimed their first win with a 55-43 victory against guest team Cayman Islands.
