## All eyes are on Jamaica as PM voices concern for AB students

Prime Minister Gaston Browne has expressed his thankfulness to all those who made it possible for the 45 students of Antigua and Barbuda nationality to move to safety, during the passage of Hurricane Melissa over Jamaica expected sometime today. The 45 students have been moved to the Hotel Pegasus in New Kingston--at the request and with the compliments of the Government of Antigua and Barbuda--where they will remain until Monday, 27 October 2025, or whenever the winds and rain subside.

The Prime Minister has asked all churches and congregations in Antigua and Barbuda to seek God's blessings on all of Jamaica, and to ask God's protection of the citizens of Antigua and Barbuda and other nation's students studying in

Jamaica. The reports reaching Antigua and Barbuda indicate that the 45 students are securely housed at the multi-storied hotel and are very thankful for the intervention of the Gaston Browne administration.

The Prime Minister pledges further assistance if necessary should the students be displaced following passage of the storm. He appealed to the organizers of Sunday's National Independence Service, that was held at the Seventh Day Adventist Church at Creekside, to pray for guidance and to say a special prayer for the protection of the students. The Prime Minister is unavoidably absent from the State, but receives regular updates on the Jamaica situation. The Prime Minister returns to Antigua on Monday.

## Immigration Minister pleased with engagement with DR community in Antigua and Barbuda

Last Friday, the Department of Immigration hosted the first of what it promises to be a series of interactions with members of the different immigrant communities resident in Antigua and Barbuda.

At Friday's meeting, it was the turn of the Dominican Republic community that was invited to hear directly from the Chief Immigration Officer, Katrina Yearwood and her staff on the procedures for two of the main concerns for members of the community; the issue of residency and the pathway to citizenship.

Speaking through an interpreter, Year-wood explained that there was much mis-conception among members of the DR community here in the country, and the meeting was called primarily to dispel these mis-conceptions.

She urged members of the community



to contact the department if they had queries or to channel these inquiries through the resident Honorary Consul for the Dominican Republic, Joaquin Diaz Lopez.

"We want the DR community to know that we are here to assist them; they need not have any fears about coming in and have their issues resolved amicably," she told the gathering.

Following a period of interactions with those in attendance, the meeting came to an end with those with more personal issues being advised to contact the Honorary Consul for further submission to the Department of Im-

migration.

At the end, the Minister responsible for Immigration, Sir Steadroy Benjamin, said he was quite pleased with how things went at the meeting.

"I'm extremely satisfied and pleased with the organization of this particular session by the Chief Immigration Officer and her staff. It was meant to explain to the Dominicanos that we are here to assist; to make certain that they understand that they must comply with the rules of immigration and that there is no need for them to fear immigration. I want to say that this is only the beginning of what is to come because there will be other programmes or sessions, like this designed specifically to improve the relationship between immigration department of our non-national communities," he declared.

Yearwood echoed the sentiments of Minister Benjamin calling the engagement 'a proud moment'. "We had a very good turnout and we are grateful for the support of the minister and the diplomatic corps represented at the meeting. The DR community need not fear the department of immigration, but they do need to understand our rules and procedures which they will soon be able to readily access through our new website that will be launched before yearend," she announced.

## The Department of Immigration debunks social media claims

The Department of Immigration is debunking claims made in a social media post that seeks to undermine what was an otherwise well-attended and well-received engagement that it held with members of the Dominican Republic community here in Antigua and Barbuda.

In attendance at the event were acting Prime Minister Sir Steadroy Benjamin, the Ambassador of the Dominican Republic to Antigua and Barbuda, Yolanda Alexandra Victoria, the Consul General of the DR to Antigua and Barbuda, Joaquin Diaz Lopez, Chief Immigration Officer, Katrina Yearwood and other senior officials of the department.

The Department acknowledged that there was enhanced security for persons entering into the meeting area and that this followed both regional and international best practices whenever senior government officials and diplomatic representatives attend functions.

"The Department stands firmly by its security methods, which represent international best practices for protecting executive officials and members of the diplomatic corps. Given the attendance of high-ranking officials at the consultation event, enhanced security measures were deemed necessary and appropriate. These protocols have been developed in consultation with regional and international security partners and are designed to ensure the safety of all attendees and officials present," a media release from the department stated.

The release added that the Department is aware that some attendees of the October 24th consultation event expressed discomfort with its security measures. "We categorically deny





any suggestion that our checkpoints were created to cause inconvenience or discomfort to members of the Dominican Republic community or any other attendees. Every protocol in place served a legitimate security function necessitated by the presence of high-level government officials and diplomatic personnel, and was applied uniformly and professionally to all persons entering the venue," according to the release.

One senior official of the department disclosed to **Point Express Newspaper** that during the security checks, four knives were confiscated from individuals with the promise that they would be returned at the end of the event.

Following the meeting on Friday night, there were a few social media postings indicating that persons were requested to present their passport before entry as part of the security procedures. The department stated categorically that this claim was untrue.

Interestingly, there have been no complaints or concerns expressed by either of the two senior representatives of the Dominican Republic who, along with their teams, were in attendance. Honorary Consul, Lopez also addressed the meeting.

Despite what have been described

as 'baseless allegations', the Department said it remains resolute that its policy of engaging with the different immigrant communities in Antigua and Barbuda will continue.

"The Immigration Department recognizes the importance of the consultation event for the Dominican Republic community and appreciates the participation of all attendees. These public consultations are vital forums for dialogue between the government and immigrant communities, and we remain committed to ensuring that security measures, while necessary, do not detract from the meaningful engagement these events are designed to facilitate," the release continued.



## Distribution of free eye glasses commences today



Distribution of more than 500 prescription eye glasses through a project jointly organized by the Ministry of Health, United Hands Incorporated and the Seventh Day Adventist Church will take place over the next two days.

The distribution begins on Monday (today) and continues tomorrow (Tuesday). The distribution of prescription glasses will take place at 39ers Square, Ministry of Health Headquarters, according to the following schedule:

Surnames A–D: Monday, October 27 | 9:00 a.m. – 12:00 p.m.

Surnames E–I: Monday, October 27 | 2:00 p.m. – 4:00 p.m.

Surnames J–Z: Tuesday, October 28 | 9:00 a.m. – 12:00 p.m.

Persons collecting their prescription glasses are required to present a valid form of identification.

The Ministry of Health describes the distribution of the fee prescription



glasses as evidence that it is fulfilling on its promise to provide free prescription eye glasses to those individuals who attended the health fair in July that was help in collaboration with United Hands Incorporated and the Seventh Day Adventist Church.

## Antigua and Barbuda's Minimum Wage comes up for review

The Antigua and Barbuda Minimum Wage comes up for its periodic review with the establishment of an advisory committee as is required by law.

The Ministry of Labour announced that the first meeting of the Minimum Wage Advisory Committee will take place next Tuesday November 4. Minister of Labour, Sir Steadroy Benjamin will address the virtual meeting to provide general directions and to formalize the work of the committee.

The virtual session will be chaired by Labour Commissioner Eltonia Anthony-David, alongside Deputy Commissioner Pascal Kentish.

The committee will receive its terms of reference, which charge the group with investigating working conditions and recommending a minimum basic wage to the Minister of Labour. This recommendation will then be reviewed by the Minister and Cabinet before a final

decision is made.

The MWAC is composed of 18 members, with six representatives each for employers, employees, and the gov-

ernment.

During the inaugural meeting, each member is permitted to invite an alternate representative to participate.

The last adjustment to the minimum wage was in January 2023, when it was increased from EC\$8.20 to EC\$9.00 per hour.



#### **Delaps Water Treatment Facility Update**

ST JOHNS ANTIGUA, 24th October 2025 - The APUA Water Business Unit team is working to gradually bring the Delaps Water Treatment Facility back online. This process involves increased treatment activities, rigorous chemical testing, and the flushing of distribution lines at various points.

Due to the age of the existing distribution valve network, complete isolation may not be possible during this process. As a result, some customers may temporarily notice a mild odour caused by residual water from earlier in the week.

As an added precaution, APUA will engage an independent agency to conduct comprehensive water quality testing before the Delaps facility resumes full operations.

## Sir Ronald Sanders to be Opening Speaker at United Nations Launch of Report on Arbitrary Detention



Antigua and Barbuda's Ambassador to the United States and Permanent Representative to the Organization of American States, Sir Ronald

Sanders, will be the opening speaker at the United Nations launch of the Report of the Independent International Panel on Arbitrary Detention in State-to-State Relations, at UN Headquarters, New York, tomorrow, Tuesday.

The event, held during International Law Week is co-hosted by Antigua and Barbuda and Canada, with Australia, Denmark, Germany, and the Netherlands as co-sponsors.

The Panel's Report is the first comprehensive legal study of arbitrary detention in state-to-state relations—the seizure of foreign nationals by a State to pressure another State. The practice violates international law, erodes trust between States. The Report sets out legal analysis and concrete recommendations to strengthen prevention, protection, and accountability.

Sir Ronald Sanders will underscore Antigua and Barbuda's early endorsement of the *Declaration Against Arbitrary Detention in State-to-State Relations* and the particular vulnerabilities of small states with limited consular networks. He will emphasize that "the seizure of people to bend the will of States is not diplomacy; it is coercion in daylight."

Other contributors include Dr. Marja Lehto, Vice-Chair of the Panel; Dr. Jean-Michel Arrighi, Secretary for Legal Affairs, Organization of American States; Dr. Elina Šteinerte, Vice Chair of NPMs, UN Subcommittee on Prevention of Torture; and Dr. Alice Jill Edwards, UN Special Rapporteur on Torture.

#### Honouring Prince Klaas on National Heroes Day: The King Who Dared to Dream of Freedom

#### King Court (Prince Klaas) Did you know? On October 20th 1736, Prince Klaas, who was also called Court was brutally executed for being one of the masterminds behind an elaborate plot, hatched late in 1735, to overthrow white rule on Antigua and to abolish slavery. The plan was that, in late October of 1736, during a grand ball for the westerners in honour of George II's coronation, a 10-gallon barrel of gunpowder would be smuggled into the building and blown up killing every single westerner at the ball. The sound of the explosion was to be an alert for several allied enslaved Africans to start killing every white they came across causing a general massacre. The plan was well hatched and more than ten huge plantations were involved in the plan. During an Akan ceremony at one of the planning meetings, Klaas was initiated as King of the black community. The planned rebellion was uncovered and evidence was found against Klaas and his men. They were sentenced to execution through horrifying means. Antigua Barbuda **Reparations Support Commision**




As Antigua and Barbuda celebrates forty-four years of political independence under the theme "Solid -Stable - Soaring," we are reminded that the foundation of our nation's resilience lies in the courage of those who dared to dream of freedom long before independence was imaginable. The theme declares a nation built on strength and endurance, solid in its foundation, stable in its growth, and soaring toward progress. Yet, who we are today is deeply rooted in truth-telling about where we have come from and the sacrifices made to get here.

This National Heroes Day,

as wreaths are laid and tributes are made, the Antigua and Barbuda Reparations Support Commission (ABRSC) calls the nation to pause and reflect on the story of Prince Klaas, as he was known by English enslavers but known as King Court by his followers. His name has become synonymous with courage, resistance, and vision. Nearly three centuries ago, King Court rose up against the brutality of slavery and paid the ultimate price for freedom.

On October 20, 1736, King Court, an Akan man from present-day Ghana, was executed in St. John's after being accused of leading one of the most elaborate and coordinated plans to overthrow white colonial rule and abolish slavery in

Antigua. The conspiracy, hatched in 1735, brought together enslaved and free Africans from more than ten major plantations in a shared pursuit of liberation.

King Court, who had been brought to Antigua around 1701 and enslaved by Thomas Kerby, Speaker of the House of Assembly, was considered unusually trusted. He was allowed to "carry on a trade" and to move freely around St. John's, an opportunity he used not for personal gain, but to mobilize and organize. His fellow conspirator, Tomboy, a carpenter enslaved by Thomas Hanson, also enjoyed a degree of autonomy. He trained apprentices, earned his own wages, and reportedly used his skills to help prepare for the uprising.

During an Akan ceremony held near St. John's, King King Court (Prince Klaas)

Did you know?

King Court and five other leaders of various plantations were executed by "breaking on the wheel" – a horrifying death sentence that was a form of crucifixion. His body was strapped to a cartwheel and spun while an executioner stroked his body until he died. Before being wheeled to death, he was severely lashed while tied to the cartwheel. Six others were hanged on iron and left to starve to death while 77 others were burnt to death.



Court was crowned King of the Coromantee, symbolizing unity and leadership among the African community. This coronation, rich in cultural and political meaning was viewed as 'slave merriment' and ignored by colonial powers. However, when word of the revolutionary plan which emerged from the ceremony reached Governor William Mathew, he acted swiftly. Klaas, Tomboy, and scores of others were, held, tortured, and forced into confessions. What followed was the most gruesome episode in Antiguan history.

Between October 1736 and March 1737, King Court and 87 men were executed in waves of English violence intended to crush the spirit of resistance. Some were burned alive, others broken on the wheel, gibbeted (hung in chains), or decapitated their heads displayed publicly as a warning.

Among those executed were men whose names deserve to be remembered: Hercules, Fortune, Jack, Venture, Cudjoe, Quash, Gift, Cuffee, Colley, Ned, Secundi, Jacko, Scipio, John Guy, Billy, Oliver, Monday, Primus, Joe, Jacob, Quamina, Harry, Caesar, Prince, Vigo, Mulatto, and many


others.

They represented every trade; carpenters, masons, coopers, fiddlers, drivers, and craftsmen, men whose knowledge built the very structures of colonial Antigua, yet whose humanity was denied. Their murders were not just acts of punishment but statements of power, designed to erase the memory of their defiance. Yet, centuries later, their names endure, a salient roll call of bravery.

King Court's own execution was particularly brutal. He was broken on the wheel, burned, and his head mounted on a pole outside the St. John's jail. But even as his body was destroyed, his spirit could not be. His vision of a free people sowed the seeds of resistance that would grow through generations, through rebellion, abolition, self-determination, and eventually, independence.

Today, a monument stands proudly on Independence Drive in his honour. Its bold design by Barry Davis, with the statue fashioned by Sir Reginald Samuel, creator of the national flag captures the enduring power of Klaas's story.

King Court was formally named a National Hero of Antigua and Barbuda in 1998. His legacy extends beyond the history of rebellion; it is a story of vision, of leadership, and of the unyielding belief that people of African descent were born free. His life invites us to continue the journey



toward full recognition, justice, and development, the pillars of the reparatory justice movement today.

As we celebrate National Heroes Day, may we honour King Court not only as a symbol of rebellion but as a reminder of the unfinished work of liberation. His sacrifice challenges us to confront the legacies of slavery, inequality, racism, and underdevelopment and to continue building a nation rooted in truth, dignity, and justice.

The Antigua and Barbuda Reparations Support Commission (ABRSC) remains steadfast in ensuring that the stories of King Court and his compatriots are not lost to time. We affirm our commitment to truth-telling, public education, and advocacy for reparatory justice, for the generations that came before us, and those yet to come.

For in remembering them, we remember ourselves.

## BOLIVARIAN REPUBLIC OF VENEZUELA VENEZUELAN GOVERNMENT

Venezuela denounces a military provocation by Trinidad and Tobago, in coordination with the CIA, aimed at provoking a war in the Caribbean

The Bolivarian Republic of Venezuela denounces before the international community the dangerous "military exercises" being carried out by the Government of Trinidad and Tobago between the 26th and 30th of this month, under the coordination, financing, and control of the United States Southern Command—an action that constitutes a hostile provocation against Venezuela and a serious threat to peace in the Caribbean.

Venezuela reports that it has captured a mercenary group with direct information from the U.S. intelligence agency, the CIA, determining that a false-flag operation is underway from waters bordering Trinidad and Tobago, or from either Trinbagonian or Venezuelan territory, intended to generate a full-scale military confrontation against our country.

This planned action clearly evokes the provocations of the USS Maine and the Gulf of Tonkin incidents, which led to the war against Spain to seize Cuba in 1898, and later enabled the U.S. Congress to authorize a war against Vietnam in 1964—conflicts from which the United States emerged defeated by the Vietnamese people after causing immeasurable destruction and tragic human losses.

The Government of Prime Minister Kamla Persad-Bissessar has renounced the sovereignty of Trinidad and Tobago to act as a military colony subordinated to U.S. hegemonic interests, turning its territory into a U.S. aircraft carrier for war throughout the Caribbean—against Venezuela, against Colombia, and against all of South America.

By aligning itself with Washington's militarist agenda, Persad-Bissessar not only seeks to attack Venezuela—a country that has always maintained a policy of energy cooperation, mutual respect, and Caribbean integration, and that shares deep historic ties of brotherhood—but also violates the Charter of the United Nations, the Proclamation of Latin America and the Caribbean as a Zone of Peace approved by CELAC, and the principles of CARICOM, which protect all Caribbean peoples.

This is not a defensive exercise; it is a colonial operation of military aggression intended to transform the Caribbean into a space for lethal violence and U.S. imperial domination.

## #EyeOnMelissa: Utility providers say recovery may require rebuilding, not just restoration



With Jamaica bracing for the impact of Hurricane Melissa, the country's major utility providers say they are as prepared as possible for the powerful system but warn that recovery efforts may require rebuilding, not just restoration.

At a joint press conference held at the Jamaica Public Service (JPS) head office in New Kingston, JPS Chief Executive Officer (CEO) Hugh Grant, Digicel Jamaica CEO Stephen Murad, and Flow Jamaica Vice President and General Manager Stephen Price assured the public that teams are on standby and ready to respond once conditions are safe.

However, they all acknowledged that the projected wind strength and rainfall

from Hurricane Melissa are likely to cause significant damage to critical infrastructure.

"A Category 4 hurricane potentially going through the middle of our island could have unprecedented damage on our facilities. Here at JPS it is likely to be a rebuild and not just a restoration," said Grant.

Grant explained that the storm's expected intensity could result in prolonged outages, which is why JPS has already secured additional equipment and personnel to assist with poststorm operations.

Meanwhile, Flow's Price reported that as of 8:00 pm on Saturday, 771 of 778 sites were fully operational across the island, and all priority one sites serving

the most densely populated areas were at 100 per cent uptime.

Price also issued a strong appeal to the public to avoid acts of theft that could hinder recovery efforts, revealing that during pre-storm assessments, about 1,300 gallons of fuel were stolen from about 10 generators.

"I ask the public to be our eyes and ears out there. When they see anybody doing anything near our sites, just report it to the police," he said.

Flow's emergency lines will remain open 24/7 at 876-929-9834 and 876-929-9837. Price added that once the Office of Disaster Preparedness and Emergency Management (ODPEM) gives the all-clear, technicians will be deployed im-

mediately, pledging transparency and consistent communication with the public.

Digicel's Murad urged Jamaicans to exercise patience as teams work to restore and, in some areas, rebuild damaged networks.

Meanwhile, Minister of Science, Energy, Telecommunications and Transport, Daryl Vaz, commended the readiness of the utility providers, noting that lessons learned from Hurricane Beryl have strengthened the country's emergency response plans. He also urged unity in the face of the looming threat.

"I am satisfied with what has been presented to me and what has been presented to the country, and I think a lot has been learned from Beryl and the continuous dialogue that has taken place since then for us to have a response to this crisis. But I want to caution Jamaica that Beryl was not a direct hit and you saw what happened with that. We are now speaking about the possibility of a direct hit at a level four or five," said Vaz.

"I appeal to all Jamaicans, put aside partisan politics, put aside any rifts you may have, and let us work together, because only that can help us at this late stage of the impending hurricane.

Another press conference is scheduled to be held at noon on Sunday. (Jamaica Observer)

## UWI Global Campus 2025 cohort to commemorate graduation via virtual ceremony

## Silent mental health issues growing concern in younger Caribbean population, says regional study


A large proportion of children and teenagers across the Caribbean are experiencing elevated symptoms of depression and anxiety.

This troubling fact is derived from the 2025 Caribbean Child and Youth Mental Health Research Study Report, a comprehensive work resulting from a collaborative effort between the CARICOM Secretariat and the United Nations Children's Fund (UNICEF). CARICOM reported that the survey, conducted in 2024, targeted young individuals throughout the Caribbean region to investigate issues related to their mental health and overall well-being, with the goal of identifying effective solutions. Over 1,500 children and youth from 17 different countries and territories participated in the study.

The findings highlighted alarming trends in the mental health landscape of Caribbean youth: 58% of respondents reported feeling a lack of hope about the future; 56% indicated they often experience ongoing worry; and 54% expressed feelings of sadness, depression, and hopelessness.

During a virtual event on October 22, where the study's results were presented, Hon. Dr. Frank Anthony, Guyana's Minister of Health, praised CARICOM and UNICEF for their vital role in gaining a deeper understanding of anxiety and depression among young populations in the region.

"These findings are signif-



icant because they would help us to address some of the issues that we face across the Caribbean," stated Minister Anthony. "Here in Guyana, we have already been examining issues related to mental health, particularly mental health among young people."

He added, "I hope these findings will lead to meaningful interventions that truly support our young people. This must not be the final study. We need to close the data gaps that persist across the Region."

Additionally, the CAR-ICOM release said that Hon. Steven Jacobs, Guyana's Minister within the Ministry of Culture, Youth and Sport, highlighted the urgent chal-

lenges impacting young people, which may contribute to heightened levels of anxiety and depression. He called for collaborative efforts to address these issues. "Across our Region, young people are facing increasing pressures from academic stress and unemployment, the lingering effects of the pandemic and social media challenges," stated Minister Jacobs, "Many are silently struggling, unsure where to turn. This is why prevention and early response are so critical. No single ministry can do it alone."

In terms of potential solutions, Michele Small-Bartley, Programme Manager for Youth Development at the CARICOM Secretariat, outlined key recommendations derived from the study's insights. She stressed the importance of improving access to mental health support services for youth, strengthening referral systems, raising awareness to combat stigma, and equipping parents and educators with the skills to recognize signs of mental distress.

"Many children, whether at home, in school, or within their communities, need our support. This document not only presents valuable data, but it also offers practical resources and evidence to guide the development of more tailored and impactful programmes for our Caribbean people," stated the Programme Manager.

## Kamala Harris leaves door open for 2028 US presidential run

Former United States Vice President Kamala Harris is not ruling out another run for the presidency.

In an interview with the BBC posted Saturday, Harris said she expects a woman will be president in the coming years, and it could "possibly" be her.

"I am not done," she said.

Harris said she hasn't decided whether to mount a 2028 presidential campaign. But she dismissed the suggestion that she'd face long odds.

"I have lived my entire career a life of service and it's in my bones. And there are many ways to serve," she said. "I've never listened to polls."

She's recently given a series of interviews following the September release of her



book, "107 Days." It looks back on her experience replacing then-President Joe Biden as the 2024 Democratic presidential nominee after he dropped out of the race.

She ultimately lost to Republican President Donald Trump.

In an interview with The Associated Press last week,

Harris, 61, also made clear that running again in 2028 is still on the table. She said she sees herself as a leader of the party, including in pushing back against Trump and preparing for the 2026 midterms.

Asked in an October 17 interview with AP whether she had plans for a 2028 bid, Harris said, "I haven't decided. Sincerely. I have not

decided. I may or I may not. I have not decided."

Asked specifically whether she still wanted to do the job itself, she used the past tense, saying, "It's a job I wanted to do." But she noted that the only way to do it "is to run" and win.

Meanwhile, political jockeying among Democrats for the 2028 presidential contest appears to be playing out even earlier than usual.

Several potential candidates are already taking steps to get to know voters in key states, including California Governor Gavin Newsom, term-limited Kentucky Governor Andy Beshear and California Congressman Ro Khanna. Upward of 30 high-profile Democrats could ultimately enter the primary. (AP)

## Two arrested over theft of jewels at Louvre museum in Paris



Two suspects have been arrested over the theft of precious crown jewels from Paris's Louvre museum, French media say.

The Paris prosecutor's office said one of the men had been taken into custody as he was preparing to take a flight from Charles de Gaulle Airport.

Items worth €88m (£76m; \$102m) were taken from the world's most-visited museum last Sunday, when four thieves wielding power tools broke into the building in broad daylight.

France's justice minister has conceded security protocols "failed", leaving the country with a "terrible image".

The Paris prosecutor's office said in a statement that the arrests had been made on Saturday evening, without specifying how many people had been taken into custody.

One of the suspects was preparing to travel to Algeria, police sources have told French media, while it is understood the other was going to Mali. Specialist police can detain and question them for up to 96 hours.

According to reports in French media on Sunday, DNA found at the scene of the robbery led to the identification of one of the suspects.

The gang left behind a number of items, including gloves and a high-vis jacket.

It has previously been reported that they dropped a crown that once belonged to Empress Eugenie, the wife of Napoleon III.

The Paris prosecutor criticised the "premature disclosure" of information related to the case, adding that it hindered efforts to recover the jewels and find the thieves.

The thieves reportedly arrived at 09:30 (08:30 GMT), shortly after the museum opened to visitors.

The suspects arrived with a vehicle-mounted mechanical lift to gain access to the Galerie d'Apollon (Gallery of Apollo) via a balcony close to the River Seine.

Pictures from the scene showed the ladder leading up to a first-floor window.

Two of the thieves entered by cutting through the window with power tools.

They then threatened the guards, who evacuated the premises, and cut through the glass of two display cases containing jewels.

A preliminary report has revealed that one in three rooms in the area of the museum raided had no CCTV cameras, according to French media.

French police say the thieves were inside for four minutes and made their escape on two scooters waiting outside at 09:38.

The museum's director told French senators this week that the only camera monitoring the exterior wall of the Louvre where they broke in was pointing away from the first-floor balcony that led to Gallery of Apollo.

CCTV around the perimeter was also weak and "ageing", Laurence des Cars said, meaning that staff failed to spot the gang early enough to stop the theft.

Experts have also expressed concern that the jewels may have already been broken up into hundreds of pieces.

Gold and silver can be melted down and the gems can be cut up into smaller stones that will be virtually impossible to track back to the robbery, Dutch art detective Arthur Brand told the BBC.

Security measures have since been tightened around France's cultural institutions.

The Louvre has transferred some of its most precious jewels to the Bank of France following the heist. They will now be stored in the Bank's most secure vault, 26m (85ft) below the ground floor of its elegant headquarters in central Paris. (BBC)

## Russia tests new nuclear-capable missile, Putin says

Russia tested a new nuclear-capable and powered cruise missile fit to confound existing defenses, inching closer to deploying it to its military, President Vladimir Putin said Sunday.

The announcement, which followed years of tests of the Burevestnik missile, comes as part of nuclear messaging from the Kremlin, which has resisted Western pressure for a ceasefire in Ukraine and strongly warned the US and other NATO allies against sanctioning strikes deep inside Russia with longer-range Western weapons.

A video released by the Kremlin showed Putin, dressed in camouflage fatigues, receiving a report from General Valery Gerasimov, Russia's chief of general staff, who told the Russian leader that the Burevestnik covered 14,000 kilometers (8,700 miles) in a key test Tuesday.

Gerasimov said the Burevestnik, or storm petrel in Russian, spent 15 hours in the air on nuclear power, adding "that's not the limit."

Little is known about the Burevestnik, which was code-named Skyfall by NATO, and many Western experts have been skeptical about it, noting that a nuclear engine could be highly unreliable.

When Putin first revealed that Russia was working



on the weapon in his 2018 state-of-the-nation address, he claimed it would have an unlimited range, allowing it to circle the globe undetected by missile defense systems.

Many observers argue such a missile could be difficult to handle and pose an environmental threat. The US and the Soviet Union worked on nuclear-powered missiles during the Cold War, but they eventually shelved the projects, considering them too hazardous.

The Burevestnik reportedly suffered an explosion in August 2019 during tests at a navy range on the White Sea, killing five nuclear engineers and two service members and resulting in a brief spike in radioactivity that fueled fears in a nearby city. Russian officials never identified the weapon involved, but the US said it was the Burevestnik.

"We need to determine the possible uses and begin preparing the infrastructure for deploying these weapons to our armed forces," Putin told Gerasimov.

The Russian leader also claimed it was invulnerable to current and future missile defenses, due to its almost unlimited range and unpredictable flight path.

Kirill Dmitriev, a top Putin aide who was in the US as the video surfaced, said his delegation informed US colleagues of the "successful testing" of the Burevestnik, which he said was an "absolutely new class" of weapon.

Earlier this week, Putin

directed drills of Russia's strategic nuclear forces that featured practice missile launches. The exercise came as his planned summit on Ukraine with US President Donald Trump was put on hold.

The Kremlin said that the maneuvers involved all parts of Moscow's nuclear triad, including intercontinental ballistic missiles that were test-fired from launch facilities in northwestern Russia and a submarine in the Barents Sea. The drills also involved Tu-95 strategic bombers firing long-range cruise missiles.

The exercise tested the skills of military command structures, the Kremlin said in a statement Wednesday. (AP)


