Government on standby to evacuate A&B students from Jamaica

The Antigua and Barbuda government is finalizing plans to evacuate Antigua and Barbuda students who are studying in Jamaica and who are likely to be impacted by the passage of Hurricane Melissa.

Latest reports overnight indicate that the hurricane was packing winds of up to 175 miles per hour and already at least one gust has been recorded at 241 miles per hour. In addition to the extremely powerful winds, Melissa is expected to dump as much as 30 to 40 inches of rain on the island before it is finished.

Director of Communications in the Office of the Prime Minister, Maurice Merchant, who oversees the Prime Minister's Scholarship Programme, spent Monday night reaching out to those students who had not moved to the Pegasus Hotel explaining the government's intention.

Merchant is urging the students to take every precaution for their personal safety as they await the passage of the storm.

Hurricane Melissa has been dubbed 'a super storm' with forecasters indicating that its threat to Jamaica for potential damage is expected to be greater than for Hurricane Gilbert, the last major storm to affect the island.

Last weekend, Prime Minister Gaston Browne gave instructions to have the Antigua and Barbuda students in Jamaica moved to the Pegasus Hotel in New Kingston for their overall safety and well-being. The initial word was that their stay there would be up to Monday, Oc-





tober 27. However, with the hurricane slowing down to 2 miles per hour up to Monday night, landfall has again been delayed.

At 8:00 pm Monday, the storm was said to be about 150 miles off the country's southern coast.

With this information, Merchant said the students' stay at the Pegasus has been extended until further notice. He revealed that the number of students there has now climbed to 53.

PM Browne has urged the entire nation to offer prayers for the people of Jamaica who are under threat of catastrophic damage to property and potential loss of life. Antigua and Barbuda, he indicated, stands ready to offer whatever assistance that it can following the passage of the storm.







Over 100 Collect Prescription Glasses on Day 1 of distribution

The Ministry of Health successfully commenced the distribution of prescription glasses on Monday at its Headquarters on High Street, where over one hundred individuals turned out to collect their eyewear.

The glasses were prescribed during the Ministry's recent Health Fair, held in June 2025 at the Multi-Purpose Cultural and Exhibition Centre. The event, hosted in collaboration with United Hands Incorporated and the Seventh-day Adventist Church, attracted thousands of citizens seeking medical, dental, and eye care services.

During the Health Fair, individuals requiring vision correction were identified and later provided with either single-lens or bifocal glasses — free of cost — as the Government of Antigua and Barbuda fully covered the expense. Those who requested progressive lenses were asked to contribute a nominal fee of \$75, a significant reduction from the usual cost of approximately \$2,000.

The Ministry notes that over 500 pairs of glasses will be distributed in total upon completion of the exercise, reflecting its continued commitment to ensuring equitable access to quality healthcare for all citizens.

Distribution continues today, Tuesday, at the Ministry of Health Headquarters between the hours of 9:00 a.m. and 12:00 midday. All individuals who were prescribed glasses during the June health fair are encouraged to visit and collect their eyewear. You are asked to walk with a valid photo I.D.

A pilot project to test for African Swine Fever is underway in Antigua and Barbuda

A pilot project is now in progress to determine whether the deadly African Swine Fever virus is present among the pig population in Antigua and Barbuda.

The Inter-American Institute for Cooperation in Agriculture (IICA) is teaming up with the Unit-

ed States Department of Agriculture to assist the Ministry of Agriculture in conducting field tests of pig farms in the country.

IICA National Specialist for Antigua and Barbuda, Craig Thomas, said fifteen technicians from the Veterinary Division of the ministry are attending the

two-day workshop on the subject.

"As part of the pilot project, we will be surveying farms to see if there is any evidence of African Swine Fever virus among the herds. This virus has the potential of wiping out entire herds of pigs and our survey is seen as a

preventive step. The virus does not affect humans, but humans play a part in spreading it from farm to farm or from country to country," Thomas explained.

He revealed that similar surveys have been conducted in approximately eight CARICOM Carib-

bean countries and the virus has not been detected in any of them. However, he noted that the virus has been found in pigs in the Dominican Republic. He explained that persons traveling to that country and who come into contact with infected pigs without observing the required safety protocols could potentially spread the virus to another country.

According to the IICA representative, there are some 25 vibrant pig farms with fifty or more pigs operating in Antigua and Barbuda that are helping to meet the growing de-



mand for pork. However, he noted that there still is a high rate of importation of pork, and that this is another area where the virus could enter the country.

On Tuesday, the team will visit four fours to conduct tests of their pigs and that the samples will be sent to an overseas lab for analysis.

Thomas emphasized that the project is an ongoing exercise with the expectation that the ministry of agriculture will secure the funding to continue the surveillance at the end of the pilot phase.

Strong earthquake and an after shock rock Antigua and Barbuda Monday morning


A relatively strong earthquake rocked Antigua and Barbuda early Monday morning with an aftershock rocking the country within the space of half an hour later.

The Antigua and Barbuda Met Office, the local agency that provides information on these phenomena, reported that the first quake was registered at approximately 8:38 am registering 6.1 on the Richter Scale.

Seventeen minutes later, at 8:55 am, the second quake or after shock, shook the country measuring 6.8 on the Richter Scale.


The first quake was said to be 16.5 degrees north and 59.6 degrees north and recorded at a depth of 10 kilometers or 6 miles. The second quake/aftershock was said to be in the general vicinity of the first.

There have not been any reports of damage to property or any injuries associated with the quakes.

HANDS OF MARIE, GISELE – Part 2

Dear Editor,

This letter was intended to be a response to an article published by D. Gisele Isaacs under the heading, "Ask what your country can do for you". However, in light of the fact that much of what I intended to say has already been dealt with in Part 1, in response to Harold Lovell's piece, and while I intend to respond to Isaacs, the main thrust here will deal with the frenzied call by the UPP and its supporters for an Independent Inquiry, into what they refer to as "vehicle gate".

Gisele Isaacs' piece, as a whole, is based on hearsay. She admits that her source was, as she admits, a "so called un-letter-headed report, which is unsigned, unvalidated and intended only to fool the public into believing that the matter is being impartially investigated and justice is being served." She relies on the fake document to support her unwarranted and dishonest attack on Minister Maria Browne.

The undeniable facts as they pertain to Minister Browne is that upon assuming the office of Minister of Works, she observed certain irregularities with regards to the purchase of government vehicles and certain illicit duty-free concessions. As a result, she brought the matter to the attention of the Prime Minister and Cabinet, which resulted in a decision that only the Cabinet could approve any and all vehicles purchased for the government and approve waivers of duty on these transactions.

Recently and approximately 2 years after those decisions, the same Minister Browne observed a high-end, high-priced Ford Bronco and 2 other heavy-duty pieces of equipment parked in the yard at the Longford Police Station. She immediately reported her sightings to the Prime Minister which led to the actions currently being undertaken by the Executive and the Ministry of Finance.

In these circumstances it is beyond belief that the Chair of the UPP, Harthe party's Facebook supporters, have sought to make the Minister, the villain of the piece, which makes no sense. But common sense is so lacking in the UPP. This would mean that the same Minister who raised the alarm and drew attention to corruption and perhaps criminality, would be doing so to implicate herself. Make this, make

No person of sane and sober mind could possibly come to that conclusion. Then there are those who assert that the buck stops with the Minister. To those I say - Ministers deal with policy; administration is dealt with by civil servants. The idea that the Minister would be signing these documents or would give a Junior Minister instructions to sign, is beyond farfetched.

The Call for an Independent Inqui-

There have been loud and vociferous calls for an Independent Inquiry but most persons have not indicated the type of Inquiry to which they refer. However, the Leader of the Opposition has clearly stated that his call is for "A Commission of Inquiry" and "the criminal charging, conviction and incarceration of those found to be guilty".

First, there must be a formal request to the Governor General to establish the Inquiry. This must be done with the consent of the Executive. The government must determine whether a Commission of Inquiry is necessary or desirable, bearing in mind the tremendous expense involved. This consists but not limited to: the appointment of a highly qualified Commissioner and a highly qualified lawyer to advise the Commissioner, which is usually a very senior lawyer.

Then an administrative team of lawyers to prepare and issue Salmon letters (summons) to every person involved in the matter, in one way or the other. Each of those persons will then

old Lovell, the opposition leader and retain lawyers. Each person will be examined and cross examined. Once established the Commission will sit for about 2 weeks, then adjourn and reconvene in a few weeks and so on. And this could last for about 6 months. The cost will be several millions of dollars.


> Then there is the question of Raison d'etre for the setting up of the Commission of Inquiry. Is it to seek evidence and facts on the matter at hand? At the conclusion of the Inquiry, the Commissions publishes its findings. It cannot pursue offenders or make orders for restitution. It can only publish its findings and name and shame.

> I note that those persons who are calling for an Inquiry are also demanding that those found culpable be charged, tried and convicted. UNFORTU-NATELY, this is a legal impossibility. As once the offenders are brought before a Commission of Inquiry and evidence taken, they CANNOT then be brought before and tried in a Court of Law. It is either a Commission of Inquiry or the Court. Make up your collective minds.

> In light of these facts, NOMAD's advice is to ignore the strident calls for a Commission of Inquiry and continue with the wide-ranging Audit being undertaken by the Ministry of Finance and the policy of restitution which has been successful. This is nothing new. Between 2006 and 2009 This is how the same UPP government at the time dealt with the IHI matter.

> P.S. For weeks Harold Lovell has been calling for an Independent Inquiry, NOMAD just happened to observe and note a political advertisement on Facebook by Lovell, now asking for an Independent Forensic Audit. Someone must have advised him that his call for an Independent Inquiry was inappropriate in the circumstances. Or maybe he is trying to upstage his Political Leader.

US warship docks in Trinidad and Tobago, putting more pressure on Venezuela

A United States (US) warship docked in Trinidad and Tobago 's capital on Sunday as the Trump administration boosts military pressure on neighbouring Venezuela and its President Nicolás Maduro.

The arrival of the USS Gravely, a guided-missile destroyer, in the capital of the Caribbean nation is in addition to the aircraft carrier USS Gerald R. Ford, which is moving closer to Venezuela. Maduro criticised the movement of the carrier as an attempt by the US government to fabricate "a new eternal war" against his country.

US President Donald Trump has accused Maduro, without providing evidence, of being the leader of the organised crime gang Tren de Aragua.

Government officials from the twin-island nation and the US said the massive warship will remain in Trinidad until Thursday so both countries can carry out training exercises.

A senior military official in Trinidad and Tobago told The Associated Press that the move was only recently scheduled. The official spoke under condition of anonymity due to lack of authorisation to discuss the matter publicly.

Kamla Persad-Bissessar, the prime minister of Trinidad and Tobago, has been a vo-



cal supporter of the US military presence and the deadly strikes on suspected drug boats in waters off Venezuela.

US Embassy Chargé d'Affaires Jenifer Neidhart de Ortiz said in a statement that the exercises seek to "address shared threats like transnational crime and build resilience through training, humanitarian missions, and security efforts".

The visit comes one week after the US Embassy in Trinidad and Tobago warned Americans to stay away from US government facilities there. Local authorities said a reported threat against Americans prompted the warning.

Many people in Trinidad and Tobago criticise the warship's docking in town.

At a recent demonstration outside the US Embassy, David Abdulah, the leader of the Movement for Social Justice political party, said Trinidad and Tobago should not have allowed the warship into its waters.

"This is a warship in Trinidad, which will be anchored here for several days just miles off Venezuela when there's a threat of war," said Abdulah. "That's an abomination."

CARICOM, a regional trade bloc made up of 15 Caribbean countries, has called for dialogue. Trinidad and Tobago is a member of the group, but Persad-Bissessar has said the region is not a zone of peace, citing the number of murders and other violent crimes. (AP)

Haitians urged to remain vigilant as Melissa blamed for four deaths and injury of 15

Haitian authorities were on Monday urging people to remain vigilant as Hurricane Melissa, a Category 5 storm, could bring life-threatening flash flooding and landslides in southwestern Haiti this week.

So far, the authorities say four people have been killed and 15 others injured since last Tuesday and the Haitian Hydrometeorological Unit (UHM), as well as the General Directorate of Civil Protection and the Permanent Secretariat for Risk Management, are maintaining a red alert for the South and Grand'Anse departments.

The South-East, Nippes, West, and central plateau departments are also on orange alert.

Hurricane Melissa is expected to bring an additional eight to 16 inches of rainfall to southern Hispaniola through Wednesday, with possible local maximum totals of 40 inches.

The Haitian authorities say catastrophic and life-threatening flash flooding and landslides are expected in southwestern Haiti and the southern parts of the Dominican Republic through midweek.

In Haiti, significant infrastructure damage and community isolation are likely with tropical storm conditions expected late Tuesday and Wednesday along Haiti's western coast.

The Departmental Directorate of Civil Protection is calling on the population to remain vigilant during this period, urging them not to cross any watercourses under any circumstances, not to tie up animals where the water could carry them away and not to stand on hills and bridges to observe flowing water.



"Store your important documents in a safe place to prevent them from getting wet. Remember to keep an eye on people in need of assistance so that they can move if necessary. Remain calm and listen to Civil Protection messages from reliable sources," the department said.

It said that the commune of Sautd'Eau remains completely cut off from communications networks due to the control exercised by armed gangs, while Savanette has been isolated for more than three days following a telephone service outage.

In Thomassique, the power supply remains severely disrupted: several small and medium-sized businesses dependent on solar energy have been forced to suspend their operations, exacerbating the crisis in essential services.

Schools remain closed in the South-East, Sud, and Grand'Anse departments, as a precautionary measure.

The authorities said that 342 shelters have already been opened in the

Southeast, South, and Grand'Anse departments.

The Miami-based National Hurricane Center (NHC) said that a tropical watch remains in effect for Haiti and Melissa is moving toward the west near three miles per hour (mph).

"A slow turn toward the northwest and north is expected today and tonight, followed by a northeastward acceleration beginning on Tuesday and continuing through at least Thursday. On the forecast track, the core of Melissa is expected to move near or over Jamaica tonight and Tuesday, across southeastern Cuba Tuesday night, and across the southeastern Bahamas on Wednesday," it said.

Melissa has maximum sustained winds of near 160 mph with higher gusts and some additional strengthening is forecast today, with fluctuations in intensity likely before Melissa makes landfall on Jamaica early Tuesday. (CMC)

Mandatory evacuations ordered for seven flood-prone communities as Hurricane Melissa nears



Prime Minister Dr Andrew Holness on Sunday ordered the immediate evacuation of several vulnerable communities across Jamaica as Hurricane Melissa bears down on the island with life-threatening rain and winds. The order was issued under the Disaster Risk Management Act.

The order covers the following areas:

- 1. Port Royal, Kingston
- 2. Portland Cottage, Clarendon
- 3. Rocky Point, Clarendon
- 4. Old Harbour Bay, St. Catherine
- 5. Taylor Land, Bull Bay, St Andrew
- 6. New Haven, St Andrew
- 7. Riverton City, St Andrew

"The Order takes effect immediately and requires all persons in the specified areas to evacuate to ensure their safety," a statement said. Holness acted on advice from the Office of Disaster Preparedness and Emergency Management.

The mandatory evacuation follows the October 24 declaration of the entire island as a threatened area under the Disaster Risk Management Act.

That declaration empowers the Government to implement precautionary and protective measures to safeguard lives, property, and critical infrastructure.

The evacuation order remains in force for as long as the Declaration of Threatened Area Order remains in force.

According to the Meteorological Service, Hurricane Melissa is expected to pass directly over Jamaica on Monday night or Tuesday morning, bringing sustained winds of 145 mph (230 km/h) and

up to 30 inches (760 mm) of rainfall in some areas.

Life-threatening storm surges of 9 to 13 feet are anticipated along the south coast, particularly near Port Royal, Old Harbour Bay, and Rocky Point. Authorities warn that widespread flooding and landslides are likely, especially in low-lying and flood-prone areas.

Earlier Sunday, Minister of Local Government Desmond McKenzie urged residents in low-lying and flood-prone areas to evacuate immediately.

Speaking ahead of the storm, he warned that many communities may not survive the expected flooding. "It is going to be impossible for us, after all the attempts that we have been making...for us to say to our first responders 'go out and risk your life,'" McKenzie said.

He noted that all 881

shelters across the country have been activated to provide safe relocation options.

Transport Minister Daryl Vaz said the state-owned bus company received four evacuation calls since Saturday. But he lamented that there has been a low makeup in some vulnerable communities.

He said residents in Flagaman in coastal St Elizabeth have "refused" to board the buses. He said only 10 persons left on a bus that was sent to Old Harbour Bay in St Catherine.

He said it's a similar low take up in Port Royal and Rae Town fishing communities in Kingston. "We have deployed our resources and are awaiting board. We actually have buses on spot, now parked, waiting to evacuate and the response is not there," he said at the news conference.

Vaz said the Jamaica Urban Transit Company state bus company has indicated that it is running limited operations but "and will likely cease operations mid afternoon due to rising water levels, low visibility and of course the weather coming closer". (Jamaica Gleaner)

Category 5 Hurricane Melissa now closer to Jamaica

Hurricane Melissa, now a Category 5 storm with winds in excess of 160 miles per hour, is inching towards Jamaica on Monday and is expected to move near or over the Caribbean island on Tuesday.

The latest bulletin from the Miami-based National Hurricane Center (NHC) said that at 8:00 a.m. the distinct eye of Hurricane Melissa was located near latitude 16.4 North, longitude 78.0 West.

Melissa is moving toward the west near 3 mph (6 km/h).

A slow turn toward the northwest and north is expected today and tonight, followed by a northeastward acceleration beginning on Tuesday and continuing through at least Thursday.

On the forecast track, the core of Melissa is expected to move near or over Jamaica tonight and Tuesday, across southeastern Cuba Tuesday night, and across the southeastern Bahamas on Wednesday.

Reports from NOAA and Air Force Reserve Hurricane Hunter aircraft indicate that maximum sustained winds are near 160 mph (260 km/h) with



higher gusts.

Melissa is a category 5 hurricane on the Saffir-Simpson Hurricane Wind Scale.

Some additional strengthening is forecast today, with fluctuations in intensity likely before Melissa makes landfall on Jamaica early Tuesday.

Melissa is expected to reach Jamaica and southeastern Cuba as a powerful

major hurricane and will still be at hurricane strength when it moves across the southeastern Bahamas.

Hurricane-force winds extend outward up to 30 miles (45 km) from the centre and tropical-storm-force winds extend outward up to 195 miles (315 km).

The minimum central pressure from the Hurricane Hunter aircraft data is 913 mb (26.96 inches). (Jamaica Gleaner)

Clashes with security forces in Cameroon kill 4 protesters ahead of election results



Clashes with security forces in Cameroon left at least four protesters dead as opposition supporters rallied to demand credible results from the African country's recent presidential election, local officials said.

More than 100 protesters were arrested in one region. The violence came as Cameroon's top court, the constitutional council, was expected to announce final election results on Monday, though the opposition and their supporters have accused authorities of seeking to rig the vote.

Hundreds stormed the streets in several cities on Sunday following days of unrest and in response to protest calls by opposition candidate Issa Tchiroma Bakary, who claims to have defeated President Paul Biya in the Oct. 12 election.

According to Samuel Dieudonne Ivaha Diboua, governor of the Littoral Region that includes the economic hub of Douala, four protesters were killed and several members of the security forces were injured in Douala after security forces and police stations were attacked by the protesters.

At least 105 protesters were also arrested and are in custody following the unrest in Douala, the governor added.

The African Movement for New Independence and Democracy opposition party and local media earlier reported that at least two protesters were shot and killed by security forces as they sought to disperse the protests.

Videos online showed protesters clashing with security forces, who fired tear gas and tried to disperse the protesters barricading major roads in Douala and other cities, including Garoua and Maroua in the north.

Dozens of opposition supporters, activists and leaders have already been arrested in recent days as the protests continued. Cameroon's Minister of Territorial Administration Paul Atanga Nji told reporters on Saturday that the government arrested several people plotting violent attacks.

One protester, Oumarou Bouba, a 27-year-old trader in the northern city of Maroua, said, "I am ready to stake my life to defend my vote. I voted for Tchiroma because I want change."

Tensions were building up ahead of the election in Cameroon, a country of nearly 30 million people. The decision by the 92-yearold Biya, the world's oldest leader who has been in power for nearly half his life, to seek reelection angered the country's youth and the opposition.

The opposition has accused Biya of having a hand in the disqualification of his strongest rival and of using "state machinery" to manipulate the election in his favor. (AP)

Two arrested over theft of jewels at Louvre museum in Paris

Two suspects have been arrested over the theft of precious crown jewels from Paris's Louvre museum, French media sav.

The Paris prosecutor's office said one of the men had been taken into custody as he was preparing to take a flight from Charles de Gaulle Airport.

Items worth €88m (£76m; \$102m) were taken from the world's most-visited museum last Sunday, when four thieves wielding power tools broke into the building in broad daylight.

France's justice minister has conceded security protocols "failed", leaving the country with a "terrible image".

The Paris prosecutor's office said in a statement that the arrests had been made on Saturday evening, without specifying how many people had been taken into custody.

One of the suspects was preparing to travel to Algeria, police sources have told French media, while it is understood the other was going to Mali.

Specialist police can detain and question them for up to 96 hours.

According to reports in French media on Sunday, DNA found at the scene of the robbery led to the identification of one of the suspects.

The gang left behind a number of items, including gloves and a high-vis jacket.

It has previously been reported that they dropped a crown that once belonged to Empress Eugenie, the wife of Napoleon III.

The Paris prosecutor criticised the "premature disclosure" of information related to the case, adding that it hindered efforts to recover the jewels and find the thieves.

The thieves reportedly arrived at 09:30 (08:30 GMT), shortly after the museum opened to visitors.

The suspects arrived with a vehi-

access to the Galerie d'Apollon (Gallery of Apollo) via a balcony close to the River Seine.

Pictures from the scene showed the ladder leading up to a first-floor win-

Two of the thieves entered by cutting through the window with power tools.

They then threatened the guards, who evacuated the premises, and cut through the glass of two display cases containing jewels.

A preliminary report has revealed that one in three rooms in the area of the museum raided had no CCTV cameras, according to French media.

French police say the thieves were inside for four minutes and made their escape on two scooters waiting outside at 09:38.

The museum's director told French senators this week that the only camera monitoring the exterior wall of the

cle-mounted mechanical lift to gain Louvre where they broke in was pointing away from the first-floor balcony that led to Gallery of Apollo.

> CCTV around the perimeter was also weak and "ageing", Laurence des Cars said, meaning that staff failed to spot the gang early enough to stop the theft.

> Experts have also expressed concern that the jewels may have already been broken up into hundreds of pieces.

> Gold and silver can be melted down and the gems can be cut up into smaller stones that will be virtually impossible to track back to the robbery, Dutch art detective Arthur Brand told the BBC.

> Security measures have since been tightened around France's cultural institutions.

> The Louvre has transferred some of its most precious jewels to the Bank of France following the heist. They will now be stored in the Bank's most secure vault, 26m (85ft) below the ground floor of its elegant headquarters in central Paris. (BBC)

Hunt on for remaining Louvre thieves after first arrests made

The hunt was on Monday for the thieves still on the run after the first suspects in the Louvre heist were arrested by French police.

Two suspects with a history of jewel thefts had been tracked for days after their DNA was recovered from the museum and were arrested Saturday shortly before one of them was set to board a flight out of the country, a police official told NBC News.

The breakthrough came a week after the robbers broke into the Galerie d'Apollon, threatening guards and drilling into display cases before escaping on scooters with eight of France's crown jewels worth an estimated \$102 million.

A major police operation has been underway to track down the thieves, who were captured on camera fleeing the scene. But there was still no sign of the jewels themselves.

Police said DNA samples discovered at the crime scene helped identify the suspects.

"They left gloves, a walkie-talkie, a vest, and a can of gasoline," Axel Ronde, spokesman for the French police union CFTC, said in an interview Monday. "And that allowed my colleagues from the forensic team to find these DNA traces," he said.

Ronde added that the two arrested suspects were both men in their 30s, who had prior convictions and were known to police having previously targeted jewelry stores.

They were both from Aubervilliers, a suburb in northeast Paris, Ronde said. He said that police decided to move in on Saturday when it became clear that one suspect was planning to flee to Algeria. He was arrested at Charles de Gaulle airport 40 minutes before the flight was due to take off.

While police can hold suspects for up to 48 hours without charge, in organized crime investigations like this one, the suspects' detention can be extended to 96 hours.

"I think there is going to be more arrests quickly," said Robert Wittman, a former FBI art crime investigator.

He added that the arrest of the first suspects would allow police to gather more evidence through searches of their homes and cell phone data.

While investigators worry that the thieves may melt down or dismantle the jewels to sell them off as soon as possible, there remains hope that the stolen artefacts can be recovered intact.

According to Wittman, the thieves may have good reason to keep the jewels preserved rather than destroy them right away.

"In places like France, and Europe, they can use those to get out of jail free," he said, adding that destroying the jewels would leave the thieves with no "bargaining tools" if arrested. Prosecutor Laure Beccuau said investigators were continuing their search for the stolen jewels and the remaining suspects, but that it was "too early" to provide the public with any more detail.

"I will release additional information at the end of this period of police custody," she said, adding that she did not want to hinder the investigation.

U.S. and China agree to a trade deal 'framework,' treasury secretary says

President Donald Trump and Chinese President Xi Jinping are expected to reach a deal to avert a new 100% U.S. tariff on Chinese goods and are likely to meet in person soon, Treasury Secretary Scott Bessent said following talks with Beijing's top trade negotiator.

Bessent told NBC News' "Meet the Press" moderator Kristen Welker in an interview Sunday that China was ready to make a deal "after two days of negotiations."

A "framework" is ready for a meeting this week between Trump and Xi that is intended to avoid the harsher tariffs threatened by Trump starting Nov. 1 should Beijing move forward with plans to put restrictions on rare earth minerals, he said.

The development could mark a potentially pivotal moment in global trade relations as the world's two largest economies edge toward easing tensions that have unsettled markets and strained diplomatic ties since Trump's tariff threats began.

"I'm also anticipating that we will get some kind of a deferral on the rare earth export controls that the Chinese had discussed," Bessent said.

China has a near-monopoly on the production and processing of rare earth minerals, which are critical components of electronic devices and defense technologies, and has alarmed the Trump administration with what it views as threats to disrupt their supply.



"President Trump gave me a great deal of negotiating leverage with the threat of the 100% tariffs, and I believe we've reached a very substantial framework that will avoid that and allow us to discuss many other things with the Chinese," Bessent said.

Trump arrived in Malaysia on Sunday for a summit of the Association of Southeast Asian Nations, his first stop in a five-day Asia tour that is expected to culminate in a face-to-face with Xi in South Korea on Thursday.

Bessent later told NBC News that Trump would most likely visit Xi in Beijing early next year, just ahead of the Lunar New Year, which is Feb. 17. He said a meeting in Washington would most likely happen ahead of Xi's planned trip to the U.S. next fall for the Group of 20 summit.

Trump has said that the first issue he plans to raise with Xi at their meeting in South Korea is fentanyl. The U.S. accuses China of failing to curb the international flow of precursor chemicals for the deadly opioid, which Trump has cited as one of his justifications for imposing tariffs.

China has defended its efforts and says the U.S. fentanyl crisis stems from American demand for the drug.

"I think we will be able to discuss them helping us get this terrible fentanyl crisis under control," Bessent said. "I think we are going to be able to discuss substantial soybean and [agriculture] purchases for our American farmers."

China's top trade negotiator, Li Chenggang, said Sunday that China and the U.S. had reached a preliminary consensus after discussions on a range of issues, including the extension of their trade truce, fentanyl and export controls.

Li and Chinese Vice Premier He Lifeng held talks in Malaysia over the weekend with a U.S. trade delegation that included Bessent and U.S. Trade Representative Jamieson Greer.

Trump struck a positive tone after the talks.

"I think we're going to have a deal with China," he said, hinting at possible meetings with Xi in China and the United States.

"We've agreed to meet. We're going to meet them later in China, and we're going to meet in the U.S., in either Washington or at Mar-a-Lago," he added. (NBC)
