Government to Open 2026 With National Service of Thanksgiving and Prayer



The Government of Antigua and Barbuda will formally usher in 2026 with the Annual National Service of Thanksgiving and Prayers, continuing a long-standing tradition of reflection and national unity at the start of the year.

The service will be held on Sunday, January 4, 2026, at 9:00 a.m., at the St. John's Pentecostal House of Resto-

ration Ministries on Lauchland Benjamin Drive.

Prime Minister Gaston Browne, members of Cabinet, and government officials are expected to attend, alongside church leaders and members of the public. The service is being hosted in conjunction with Bishop Stephen Andrews and the congregation of the St. John's Pentecostal House of Restoration Ministries.

The Annual National Service of Thanksgiving and Prayers has become a fixture on Antigua and Barbuda's civic calendar, traditionally marking the symbolic transition from one year to the next through collective reflection, faith, and national purpose.

The annual observance provides an opportunity for national thanksgiving and prayer as the country looks ahead to the challenges and possibilities of the new year.

Government Begins Final Tranche of Retroactive Pay for Public Sector Workers

Prime Minister and Minister of Finance Gaston Browne says the government has begun disbursing the final tranche of retroactive wages owed to public-sector employees under the 2018–2023 wage agreement, marking the end of that negotiating cycle.

According to the Prime Minister, the Treasury Department is processing the third retroactive payout, and payments to serving employees are expected to be completed within 48 hours. Workers who have since left the public service, including retirees, are expected to receive their remaining balances by the end of the week.

Browne said the disbursements cover the full range of government employment categories, including established and non-established staff, as well as weekly- and monthly-paid workers. He added that with the previous negotiating period now concluded, the administration intends to keep com-

pensation current, avoiding a build-up of arrears.

Further details on eligibility were outlined in a Monday circular issued by Deputy Financial Secretary Carolyn Charles-Tonge, who confirmed that Cabinet approved the additional payout at its December 15, 2025, meeting. The payment is equivalent to one month's gross basic salary and applies to eligible non-established public sector employees who were in government service on or before December 31, 2024, and who remain employed.

The installment follows earlier retroactive payments made in December 2022 and December 2024, under terms agreed with the relevant bargaining agents. Employees whose remaining balance after the first two payments is less than one month's salary will receive the outstanding amount in full.

Workers who retired or resigned on or before December 31, 2025, will also be paid up to one or two months' salary, based on current wage rates, to settle any remaining balance.

Excluded from the payout are parliamentarians and ministers, judges, participants in the Work Experience Programme, and contract officers whose agreements did not include negotiated salary increases.

Officials say the payout aligns with the government's broader effort to settle outstanding wage liabilities, maintain fiscal stability, and regularize public-sector compensation.

The Ministry of Finance said no additional documentation is required from employees. Payments have already begun, with active employees expected to be settled within 48 hours and other cases completed by January 31, 2026. Further information on any remaining retroactive balances will be communicated at a later date.







Former LIAT 1974 Workers in Antigua to Receive Second Compassionate Payment



Former employees of LIAT 1974 Ltd based in Antigua and Barbuda are to receive a second tranche of compassionate payments from the Government of Antigua and Barbuda, funded through the government's bond issue.

Prime Minister and Minister of Finance Gaston Browne said the government will make an additional EC\$2 million payment to former LIAT 1974 workers, following an earlier disbursement.

The Prime Minister reiterated that the payment is not a legal obligation but a compassionate intervention in response to the hardship employees displaced by the airline's liquidation face. "This is a gratuitous payment. There is no legal basis to do so," Browne said, noting that the administration's decision reflects its pro-labour philosophy and its desire to respond equitably to workers affected by the collapse of LIAT 1974 Ltd.

Browne acknowledged that some former workers and trade unions may remain dissatisfied, particularly given the absence of full severance payments after LIAT's closure. However, he said the government remains committed to continued engagement and dialogue, and to taking reasonable steps to ameliorate the circumstances of Antiguans and Barbudans left without severance, within the limits of the public purse.

Former LIAT 1974 employees will be required to confirm their details with the appointed administrator for the now-defunct carrier to receive payment.

LIAT 1974 Ltd ceased operations in 2020 and was formally liquidated in 2024, leaving hundreds of employees across the region without severance. The Government of Antigua and Barbuda has since maintained that, while it was not legally responsible for severance obligations, it has sought to provide limited financial relief on compassionate grounds and has kept channels open with affected workers.

72 specialized vehicles arrive in Jamaica to help JPS electricity restoration



to the remaining 12 per cent of cus-

tomers still without electricity.

JPS has approximately 700,000 customers.

The new arrival brings to roughly 160 the total number of specialised vehicles deployed since the hurricane struck the island on October 28, the company said.

Holland Power Services, one of three firms contracted by JPS for hurricane recovery, joins Tempest and Greystone in the restoration efforts.

The Government loaned JPS US\$150 million (J\$24 billion) to help speed up restoration. (Jamaica Gleaner)

The Jamaica Public Service Company (JPS) says 72 specialised vehicles, including bucket trucks, diggers, pole trailers, and pick-ups, have arrived in Jamaica to boost electricity restoration after Hurricane Melissa.

The vehicles were offloaded at Freeport, Montego Bay, on Sunday and will be used by a team from Holland Power Services crews

"The newly deployed assets will be assigned primarily to Westmoreland and other areas of western Jamaica, where damage to the electricity network was most severe and where rebuilding and restoration activities remain most intense, "the company said in a statement on Monday.

Detommie Fuller, JPS manager for Business Continuity Resiliency and Contract Management, said the additional fleet will ensure linemen, working alongside Jamaican, Caribbean, and international crews, are fully equipped to restore power

Sugar Mas 54: Music, Pan and Pageantry in Full Swing

As Sugar Mas 54 moves through its core period, St. Kitts & Nevis' Carnival season unfolds in deliberate layers, with music commanding the road, pan asserting precision, folk traditions holding the cultural line, and pageantry anchoring ceremony and youth.

Preliminary reports from on-the-ground observers indicate hundreds of Antiguans and Barbudans are among the regional visitors currently feting in Basseterre, adding to the strong Eastern Caribbean presence that has defined the season so far.

Sugar Mas surged into full gear at J'ouvert on December 26, when paint, powder, oil, and rhythm reclaimed the streets before sunrise. More than a symbolic opening, J'ouvert proved decisive.

Road March was officially decided at J'ouvert,

with Nu Vybes Band International claiming the title with Home Coming, after a tightly contested tie with Kollision Band and TMI, resolved through tiebreak procedures. The outcome reaffirmed a familiar Carnival truth across the region: Road March belongs to the people, not the clipboard.

Earlier, on December 21, the Groovy and Power Soca Monarch competitions showcased the range of the Sugar Mas sound. King Tobap topped the Groovy category, while King Brandon claimed Power Soca honours, confirming that St. Kitts' soca identity remains both versatile and road-ready.

On December 29, steelpan claimed centre stage with Panorama, reinforcing pan's role as cultural benchmark rather than sideshow. The Bank of Nevis EBJ Harmonics Steel Orchestra extended their

dominance, capturing a sixth consecutive Panorama title with a commanding performance. Nevis Development Steel Orchestra followed closely, underscoring Nevis' continued influence on the federation's pan tradition.

Panorama at Sugar Mas remains a moment of discipline and craft, where arrangement, execution, and collective memory matter more than volume.

Beyond the headline competitions, Sugar Mas 54 reaffirmed its cultural foundations at the National Bank Group Folk Galore Competition, held on December 18 and hosted by the Department of Cultural Heritage. Featuring Masquerade, Bull, and Mixed Folk categories, the event celebrated the living folklore of St. Kitts & Nevis. Traditional masqueraders, distinguished by elaborate peacock-feathered crowns, mirrored costumes, rhythmic footwork, and ceremonial choreography, delivered performances rooted in history rather than in trend.

Folk Galore remains a vital pillar of the Sugar Mas calendar, signaling that Carnival here is not only about movement and music but also about memory, transmission, and national identity.

Pageantry has provided Sugar Mas 54 with its ceremonial framework. Tresjeur Dedier was crowned Miss St. Kitts & Nevis 2025 after a closely contested night that blended elegance, confidence, and cultural expression.

At the regional level, Maya Marcellin was the first British Virgin Islands delegate to win the Miss Caribbean Talented Teen crown, with Antigua & Barbuda's Tekyra Richards among the nine contestants, underscoring Sugar Mas' regional reach.

The Junior Carnival Parade on December 27 further underscored youth as a central investment, not an afterthought.

Attention turns to the Calypso Monarch competition on December 30, where social commentary and lyrical tradition take centre stage, followed by the Grand Carnival Parade on New Year's Day, expected to deliver the visual climax of the season.

At this point in Sugar Mas 54, music has claimed the road, pan has asserted discipline, folk traditions have held their ground, and pageantry has reinforced

continuity. For many Antiguans and Barbudans on the ground in Basseterre, the message is clear: this is a Carnival that understands both celebration and structure as it moves confidently toward the new year.

Buck and Sons Landscaping Services gained an automatic berth into the final by finishing at the top of their preliminary standings with 90 points, winning nine and losing one of their quota of 10 matches.

Buck and Sons Landscaping Services beat Long Island Lightning by six wickets at Rising Sun in their last preliminary round outing in the 10-overs-aside competition.

Long Island Lightning was restricted to 55 for three off their allotted 10 overs. Kerique Mentore hit an unbeaten 19, and Kim George scored 17.

Male player of the match Charanlall Ramjohn picked up a wicket without conceding a run in his two overs, and female player of the game Kimberly Anthony captured one for 19.

In reply, Buck and Sons coasted to victory by scoring 56 for four in 4.2 overs. Kadeem Henry struck 21, Charanlall Ramjohn made 12, and Denley Thomas scored 10 not out. Kerique Mentore bagged three for 21, and Kelvin Loraine claimed one for 10.

The Antigua and Barbuda Defense Force (ABDF) clinched an automatic spot in the semi-finals by finishing second in the prelimi-

nary standings with 75 points.

The ABDF wrapped up their preliminary round campaign in the six-team competition by claiming their seventh win in 10 matches with a 21-run victory over the Long Island Lightning.

The ABDF managed to post 119 for four off their 10 overs. Male player of the game Mervin Higgins hammered 37, Shaquan Reifer hit 29, and Vaughn Charles scored 21.

Kelvin Loraine took two for 13, Mandy "Remover" Weatherhead picked up one for 10, and Kerique Mentore claimed one for 24.

The Long Island Lightning were then restricted to 98 for six in their 10 overs. K'Omah Telemacque cracked 45, and Kim George scored 21.

Female player of the game Mouricia Willette snapped up two wick-

ets for five runs, Vaughn Charles bagged two for 14, Malique Gerald had one for 15, and Mervin Higgins picked up one for 24.

Construction Solutions clinched fourth place in the preliminary standings with 35 points after recording their third win in 10 matches by pulling off a 96-run victory against PEL Workers in their last outing.

Construction Solutions scored 161 for three off their 10 overs. Male player of the match Charles James slammed 61, Clarence Francis smashed an unbeaten 33, and Veston Lewis hit 32. Carl Simon captured two for 12, and Brian Bailey claimed one for 30.

In reply, PEL Workers could only muster 65 for six off their allotted 10 overs. Brian Bailey struck 26, and Karl Simon made 12.

Adrian Abbott grabbed two wickets for one run, female player of the game Menova picked up one wicket for seven runs, Kenny Benjamin had one for 10, and Charles James took one for 16.

The four teams that finished outside the top two at the end of the preliminary rounds will battle in a playoff for the other semi-final spot on Sunday.

Defending champion TG Welding will meet Long Island Lightning, and Construction Solutions will take on PEL Workers.

The winners of the two playoff matches will clash in an eliminator to determine the other semi-finalist.

Scorpions extend unbeaten run in First Division League



The Freemans Village Scorpions continued their unbeaten run during the latest round of matches in the Antigua and Barbuda Football Association's (ABFA) First Division League.

The Scorpions notched up their sixth win in seven matches by snatching a 1-0 victory against the Greenbay Hoppers at the Freemans Village playing field on Monday.

Following a goalless first half, Roy Gregory broke the deadlock when he scored the only goal of the match with a strike in the 75th minute to snatch

victory for the Scorpions.

The result allows the Freemans Village Scorpions to join Golden Grove FC, which has played eight matches, at the top of the standings with 19 points each.

The Greenbay Hoppers remain on 15 points after succumbing to their second loss in seven matches.

Zahdeir Forde scored twice to propel the Willikies FC to their second win in eight matches with a 4-0 drubbing of the Swetes Vipers FC at the ABFA Technical Center.

Forde converted a penalty kick in the 47th minute and got his second goal of the match with a strike in the 58th minute.

Novelle Francis' fifth-minute conversion gave Willikies a one-nil lead at halftime, and Randy Thomas sealed the win by scoring his team's final goal in the 89th minute.

Willikies FC moved on to seven points, while the Swetes Vipers remain on 10 points after crashing to their third defeat in nine matches.


However, there was no winner in the encounter between Five Islands FC and SAP FC, as both teams battled to a 1-1 draw in their meeting at the ABFA Technical Center.

Charles and Fenton win gold as A&B finish 5th at CARIFTA Games

Antigua and Barbuda secured a respectable fifthplace finish at the 52nd CARIFTA Track and Field (athletics) Games, which took place at the Hasely Crawford Stadium in Port-of-Spain, Trinidad, from April 19 to 21.

Zonique Charles and Tyra Fenton produced gold medal performances as Antigua and Barbuda finished the three-day meet with five medals.

Zonique Charles won gold on the final day of the three-day meet with victory in the Under-17 Girls javelin with a personal best of 46.29 meters in the final.

The 400-meter action also brought joy to Antigua and Barbuda, as Tyra Fenton of St. Anthony's Secondary School and Roots Athletics Club delivered the country's first track medal of the games in the girls' Under-17 final.

Running with fluidity and control, she clocked a new personal best of 53.93 seconds, improving on last year's third-place (bronze) finish to claim the top spot.

Sprinter Geolyna Dowdye of Princess Margaret School and Power Speed and Endurance (PSE) Track Club also improved on her bronze-medal finish at last year's games to capture silver in 11.43 seconds in the Under-20 Girls 200-meter final.

Antigua and Barbuda's Ranique Richards picked up the bronze in the female Under-17 shot put. Richards threw a distance of 12.57 meters to become the first medalist for Antigua and Barbuda at the 2025 CARIFTA Games.

The 52nd edition of the Carifta Games in 2025 was won by Jamaica for the 39th consecutive time with a total of 78 medals, comprising 30 spectacular golds, 27 silver medals and 31 bronze medals in an outstanding performance.

The Bahamas came in second place with 16 gold, 13 silver and 8 bronze medals, Trinidad and Tobago came in third with 9 gold, 6 silver and 10 bronze medals, and Grenada secured fourth place with 13 medals.

Success for Antiguan swimmers at CARIFTA Aquatics Championships

Antigua and Barbuda won seven medals on the final night to finish with an overall total of 13 medals at the 38th CARIFTA Aquatics Championships, which concluded at the National Aquatic Centre in Couva, Trinidad and Tobago, from April 19 to 22.

The standout performer for the Antigua and Barbuda swimmers was Alessandro Bazzoni, who dominated the boys 11-12 age group, winning five medals.

Bazzoni clocked a personal best to win two of his medals on the final night. He won the gold in the 200-meter butterfly and claimed silver in the 200-meter individual medley final.

Earlier in the three-day regional

meet, Bazzoni also won gold in the 400-meter individual medley, silver in the 200-meter freestyle, and a bronze in the 100-meter butterfly final.


Ellie Shaw won her second of two medals when she captured gold in the 50-meter breaststroke in the girls 15-17 age-group category. Shaw also captured a silver medal in the 200-meter breaststroke final.

Madison MacMillan won a silver medal, Ethan Stubbs-Green picked up a silver and a bronze, and Anya De-Gannes also claimed a silver and a bronze medal.

Aunjelique Liddie won the other medal for Antigua and Barbuda on the final night, producing a personal best and setting a new national record in winning bronze in the final of the 100-meter freestyle final in the girls 15-17 category.

This year's CARIFTA Aquatics Championships saw the Bahamas take the overall team trophy, amassing a total of 979 points. Behind them were Jamaica who captured the runners-up spot with 795.50 points, followed by the host nation of Trinidad & Tobago with 735 points.

The Bahamas' victory represented their 7th consecutive trophy and their 9th in the past 10th editions. The Bahamas ended the competition with 74 medals in all, including 27 gold, 23 silver, and 24 bronze.

Grenada dethrones Antigua to regain OECS Swim Championship title



The Antigua and Barbuda team that represented the twin-island state at the 33rd OECS Swimming Championships in St. Vincent and the Grenadines from November 7 to 9.

Grenada dethroned Antigua and Barbuda as champions of the Organization of Eastern Caribbean States (OECS) Swimming Championships during the 33rd edition of the three-day event in St. Vincent and the Grenadines.

The Grenadians regained the OECS Swimming Championship from three-peat title holder Antigua and Barbuda during the competition at the Shrewsbury Aquatic Centre in St. Vincent from November 7 to 9.

This win is significant, as it is Grenada's first title since 2019, after which there was a two-year break in competition during the COVID period.

Grenada took home 84 medals while amassing a total of 1263.50 points over second-place St. Lucia with 1,239 points. Host St. Vincent and the Grenadines clinched third place.

Antigua and Barbuda, which won the competitions in 2022, 2023, and 2024, finished in fourth place with a total of 1,117 points.

They were followed by St. Kitts & Nevis with 160 points, Dominica with 72 points, and Anguilla, which finished in the cellar with eight points.

Antigua wins 2025 ECVA Men's Final Four title

Antigua and Barbuda swept St. Lucia 3-0 in the final to win the inaugural 2025 Eastern Caribbean Volleyball Association's (ECVA) Men's Final Four Championship at the indoor stadium at the YMCA Sports Complex in St. John's on Sunday, September 21.

Antigua and Barbuda gained revenge for a 3-0 loss to the St. Lucians in the last encounter in the preliminary stage with their commanding 25-23, 25-19, and 25-15 victory in the championship decider and qualified for the 2026 NORCECA Pan American Cup.

Dominica captured the bronze medals in the ECVA's Men's Final Four tournament, defeating Grenada 3-0 in straight sets (25-19, 28-26, and 26-24) in the playoff for third place.

It is the third consecutive title for Antigua and Barbuda, who won the ECVA's men's championship in 2023 and 2024 and qualified for their debut appearance at the 12-team 18th Senior Men's Pan American Cup, which was held in Mexico from August 26 to 31.

Despite their last-place finish at this year's Pan American Cup, head coach Carl Williams said Antigua and Barbuda benefited from their participation at the NORCECA event in Mexico by providing the Antiguans with adequate preparation to win the ECVA's Men's Final Four Championship.

Antigua and Barbuda lost all five games to finish last in the 12-team 18th Senior Men's Pan American Volleyball Cup in Mexico.

Guatemala concluded the tournament with a 3-0 (25-10, 25-16, 25-17) victory over Antigua and Barbuda to finish in 11th place in the competition with a 1-5 record.

Meanwhile, Venezuela was crowned

undefeated champion of the 18th Senior Men's Pan American Volleyball Cup after defeating Mexico 3-1 (25-23, 25-20, 20-25, 25-19) in the gold medal match that closed the event.

This title marks Venezuela's first-ever gold medal in the history of the Pan American Cup, adding to the bronze medal they earned in 2015.

Host nation Mexico claimed the silver medal, the second in its history, bringing their overall tally to four medals: one gold, one silver, and two bronze.

Venezuela finished undefeated with six victories, 15 sets won and only three lost. Mexico closed the tournament with a record of four wins and two losses, placing second.

Canada swept Colombia 3-0 (27-25, 25-22, 25-14) to claim the bronze medal at the Pan American Cup.

Host Antigua retains World Domino Championships

Antigua and Barbuda created history by winning the World Council of Domino Federations (WCDF) tournament for the fourth consecutive time.

Hosts Antigua and Barbuda achieve the feat by being crowned joint champions with St. Kitts and Nevis at the 20th World Domino Championships at the John E. St. Luce Conference Center on August 16.

Barbados and St. Lucia defaulted their final match to St. Kitts and Nevis, which allowed the Kittitians and reigning defending champions Antigua and Barbuda to finish at the top of the eight-team competition with 13 points each.

After capturing the world domino championship in 2016, 2018, and 2023, Antigua and Barbuda added the 2025 title to their collection, becoming the first WCDF member territory to win four consecutive crowns.

Barbados clinched their place with a total of five points during the August 10 to 18 world tournament, which concluded with an award and presentation ceremony on Monday.

The other participating countries in this year's event are Dominica, Guyana, the United States of America (USA), and Anguilla.

The participants were engaged in competitive disciplines, comprising Team Four Hand, Female Three Hand, Male Three Hand, Mixed Pairs, Female Pairs, Queen of Domino, and King of Domino.

Leewards achieve historic Women's Super50 Cup victory

The Leeward Islands recorded their first and only win in the 2025 CG United Women's Super50 Cup, which was won by Trinidad and Tobago after pulling off a seven-wicket win against Barbados in the final at Warner Park in St. Kitts on March 7.

The Leeward Islands head coach Percy Daniel was beaming with pride and emotion as he reflected on his team's historic triumph in the CG United Women's Super50 Cup, which took place in St. Kitts from 24 February 24 to March 7.

Daniel's side registered their first-ever victory in the 50over format of the tournament when they edged defending champions Jamaica by a single wicket in a dramatic run chase at Warner Park in St. Kitts on Monday, March 3.

Jamaica posted a formidable total of 253 for nine, but Leeward Islands responded in emphatic fashion to get to 257 for nine and claim a stunning victory.

It was a performance defined by grit, teamwork, and individual brilliance, with several players stepping up in crucial moments to etch their names into the history books.

Meanwhile, the Leeward Islands missed out on winning their first Cricket West Indies (CWI) Rising Stars Under-19 Women's title for the second successive year in Trinidad and Tobago.

After being denied the title in 2024 in a 23-run defeat

via the Duckworth-Lewis-Stern (DLS) method in the final against Guyana at the Brian Lara Cricket Academy, the Leeward Islands young women suffered a seven-wicket loss via the DLS method against Barbados in the final at the Diego Martin Sporting Complex in Trinidad on July 19.

Barbados were crowned champions of the West Indies Rising Stars Under-19 Women's Championship after defeating Leeward Islands for the second time in three days.

The Leeward Islands had advanced to the final despite losing their last preliminary round match against Barbados by seven wickets at the Sir Frank Worrell Memorial Ground in St. Augustine on July 17.

In the final at Diego Martin, the Leeward Islands were dismissed for 93 in 23.3 overs.

In reply, Barbados reached their revised target comfortably, closing on 72 for three in 12.2 overs.

Trinidad and Tobago's under-19 women's cricketers held their nerve to secure a dramatic one-wicket victory over Jamaica under-19 women in the third-place playoff at the Sir Frank Worrell Memorial Ground.

The Trinidadians were set a modest target of 118 but were made to work hard for the win, with Jamaica's bowlers striking regularly to keep the game alive until the final over. In the end, the Trinis got home at 118 for nine, winning off the final ball to finish their campaign on a high.

Asked to bat first, the Warriors reached a score of 136 for three with opener Amy Hunter scoring 29 from 36 balls. The rest of the top order supported but could not muster enough boundaries to put

on a truly challenging total.

Dane Van Niekerk (27) and captain Shermaine Campbelle (28) joined forces to put together an unbeaten 56-run partnership for the fourth wicket after Stafanie Taylor was forced to retire hurt just when the Warriors were looking to accelerate the scoring.

In reply, the Royals lost two wickets in the power-play, including the inform Chamari Athapaththu for 25. However, Kycia Knight and Courtney Webb each scored 31 to set up the push for

a third consecutive title despite a late fightback from the hosts.

Athapaththu scored the most runs in the tournament, and along with seven wickets, was named Player of the Series.

Ashmini Munisar and Laura Harris of the Warriors each bagged eight wickets to share the prize for the most wickets.

With the win, the Royals have now extended their dominance over the Warriors to 9-0.

The Trinbago Knight Riders held their nerve to beat the Guyana Amazon Warriors by three wickets in a tense finale to win the 2025 Republic Bank Caribbean Premier League (CPL) title at a jam-packed Providence Stadium in Guyana on September 21.

The Warriors were restricted to 130 for eight off their 20 overs, and the Knight Riders secured their victory by scoring 133 for seven with 12 balls to spare.

The Antigua and Barbuda Falcons' campaign in this year's CPL came to an end in a nine-wicket loss to former champions, the Trinbago Knight Riders (TKR), in the eliminator match at the National Stadium in Providence, Guyana, on September 16.

The Falcons, who made 166 for eight off their 20 overs, had a brilliant second-wicket partnership of 108 between Andries Gous and Amir Jangoo, but a late flurry of wickets saw the Knight Riders keep them to a gettable total.

The stars for the Trinidadian franchise were captain Nicholas Pooran and Alex Hales, who both made fifties as the Knight Riders won with relative ease, scoring 168 for one in 17.3 overs.

Pooran struck an unbeaten 90 off 53 balls, including eight sixes and three fours, and Hales cracked 54 not out off 40 balls, including three sixes and three fours, as both batters shared an unbroken second-wicket partnership of 143 runs.

The loss means the Falcons headed home having made the knockout stages for the first time in their two-year history after becoming the CPL's newest franchise in 2024.

Antiguan all-rounder Karima Gore and Trinidadian fast bowler Jayden Seales topped the bowling and batting aggregates for the Antigua and Barbuda Falcons during their 2025 campaign.


dad and Tobago on August 21.
