

No new taxes in Budget 2026

It's Budget Day in Antigua and Barbuda when Prime Minister and Finance Minister Gaston Browne will present the government's fiscal priorities for the next financial year.

Already sources close to the government have indicated that the 2026 National Budget will not prescribe any new tax measures as the government expects to increase revenues by increased economic activities and by reducing certain concessions that are offered to businesses.

The sources say the 2026 National Budget will also contain several 'goodies' for workers in the public sector. Not only will public servants receive their December salaries and wages early, but there is word that there will likely be a second salary to be paid out by the end of the month.

The government had earlier indicated that it will continue the tradition of paying December salaries early in order to enable public servants to be able to take advantage of the re-


duction in the ABST slated for December 19-21.

In his presentation, PM Browne is also expected to make an announcement regarding back-pay for public servants as well as the implementation of another round of salary increases.

As is customary, the prime minister will provide details of the government's revenue intake for the year following another successful year where actual intake surpassed the budgeted amounts.

Details on the amount of money that will be provided to each ministry will also be announced during the budget presentation.

The overall budget for 2026 is expected to be in excess of 2-billion dollars.

Celia Roberts-Morgan named Coordinator for CHOGM, 2026

Business consultant, Celia Roberts-Morgan, has been named by the government as Coordinator of the National Task Force responsible for planning all aspects of the preparation towards Antigua and Barbuda's hosting of the Commonwealth Heads of Government Meeting (CHOGM), 2026.

Roberts-Morgan will be based at the CHOGM Secretariat which has been established at the Ministry of Trade located on Friar's Hill Road. She will serve as the coordinator of the several sub-committees responsible for the planning and execution of the various events associated with CHOGM.

She will also serve a dual role as head of the committee planning the Business Forum, one of four such events that will take place as part of CHOGM. The others are the People's Forum, the Women's Forum and the Youth Forum. Roberts-Morgan's appointment was formally announced on Tuesday when the Task Force convened a meeting at the American University of Antigua. That meeting heard updates from the sub-committee chairs who provided insights into their planning and the progress that they have been making thus far.

Celia Roberts Morgan describes herself as a strategic human resource consultant, governance and organizational development specialist and business leader.

She is a seasoned business consultant, Chartered Director, and Human Resource strategist with over two decades of experience advancing organizational effectiveness and public-sector transformation across the Caribbean. As the founder and principal consultant of Roberts & Associates, she has advised governments, financial institutions, and hospitality enterprises on strategic HR, governance, and policy reform—strengthening institutional performance while fostering cultures of integrity, inclusion, and accountability.

The winner of the Prime Minister's Global Award will receive a unique artisan-crafted wooden award shaped as the twin-islands with the Antigua Black pineapple featured.


In addition to the awards gala, honourees will enjoy a curated itinerary highlighting some of Antigua and

The Antigua and Barbuda Chamber of Commerce and Industry and DeVry University have signed an agreement through which members of the private sector grouping and their staff as well as other nationals of Antigua and Barbuda may pursue higher learning through the American university's online programme.

The agreement was penned by former president of AB-CCI, Dr Errol Samuel and Vice President of Strategic



Partnerships - DeVry University, Scarlett Howery.

On hand to witness the

signing of the agreement was the new Principal of the Antigua and Barbuda College for Advanced Studies (ABCAS), Dr. Jonah Greene, who also delivered the keynote address.

She noted that both Prime Minister Gaston Browne and Education Minister, Daryll Matthew are deeply committed to a strategic vision of education as a driving force towards economic development. She noted that PM Browne often speaks of building an economic powerhouse premised on the idea that an educated people will propel

economic development and growth.

She added that building collaborative relationships with institutions like DeVry forms part of that thrust towards achieving that goal. ABCAS, she noted is intent on helping to build an economic powerhouse through the revolutionization of education.

"Today marks a transformative moment for Antigua and Barbuda, as we advance toward one of our most ambitious national education goals; ensuring that every household in the country has at least one degree-holder. This vision is not symbolic. It is strategic and intentional. It is a com-



mitment to lifting families, strengthening communities and securing a prosperous and competitive future for our nation," she declared.

DeVry University's Director for International En-

rollment, Neville Madden, noted that in a world where technology is shifting and where industries are transforming, the skills that powered yesterday's economy won't drive tomorrow's prosperity. Intellectual capital, he added, must be continuously invested, refreshed and expanded, or it loses its value.

"We proudly launch the DeVry University Bridge to Brilliance Initiative, making high-quality, career-focused, technology-embedded US education accessible and affordable," he remarked.

He announced that eligible students will get a 50 percent tuition assistance, a waiver in application fee and access to over 140 online undergraduate, graduate and certificate programmes designed by industry experts.

AT&LU President DeNully continues his advocacy on behalf of migrant workers at CCL conference

The 22nd Triennial Delegates Conference of the Caribbean Congress of Labour (CCL) is entering Day three today in Port of Spain, Trinidad, under the theme "One Caribbean, One Voice: Advancing Workers' Rights through Governance and Solidarity".

A sub-theme for this year's conference is "Balancing Mobility and Protection: Building a Fair Labour Migration System," as the regional labour movement continues to address the urgent challenges facing workers throughout the Caribbean.

Representatives from three Antigua and Barbuda trade unions are attending the CCL conference; the delegates are, three from the Antigua Trades and Labour Union (AT&LU), another three from the Antigua and Barbuda Workers Union (ABWU) and one from the Antigua and Barbuda Public Service Association (ABPSA).

AT&LU President Bernard De Nully participated in a panel discussion




Bernard DeNully makes a point in his presentation at CCL Conference

on the topic; Balancing Mobility and Protection: Building a Fair Labour Migration System.

In his presentation, De Nully underscored the importance of equal rights for migrant workers, paralleling those of local employees. He highlighted the core mission of the AT&U, which is dedicated to safeguarding workers' rights and ensuring fair wages.

"There should not be any form of social injustice meted out to migrant workers as we adhere to the concept to Balance Mobility and Protection and Building a Fair Labour Migration System. There also must be an established policy that is equitable and which follows the fair recruitment framework to give suitable and qualified workers be they nationals, CAR-ICOM nationals or migrants workers a reasonable recruitment process for employment," he declared.

He added that it is quintessentially important for the social dialogue between government, employers and trade unions to continue, as collectively, they seek a more equitable system for all, including migrant workers.

Delegation from the Caribbean Studies Center of Hangzhou Normal University Deepens Medical Cooperation with Antigua and Barbuda

A delegation from the Center for Caribbean Studies at Hangzhou Normal University visited, Minister of Health, Sir Molwyn Joseph of Antigua and Barbuda. Professor Zhang Xingwei, the head of the delegation, Director of the Affiliated Hospital and Dean of the School of Clinical Medicine of Hangzhou Normal University, and a renowned cardiovascular expert, conveyed the greetings of Professor Tang Ruikang, President of Hangzhou Normal University, to Minister Joseph.

President Tang warmly welcomed Minister Joseph's visit to the university and expressed high regard for the significance of this event.

The two parties held a candid and indepth discussion on deepening bilateral medical cooperation and successfully conducted a signing ceremony for the cooperation agreements. Seven agreements were signed, covering key areas such as the establishment of a Chest Pain Center, the development of internet-based hospitals, and the training of medical personnel.

Minister Joseph highly praised the clinical medical capabilities of Hangzhou Normal University and its affiliated hospital, emphasizing that this cooperation has created a historic milestone in Antigua and Barbuda's international medical collaborations. President Zhang Xingwei stated that, under the guidance of the Chinese Embassy in Antigua and Barbuda and Hangzhou Normal University, the affiliated hospital will earnestly advance the seven agreements, particularly focusing on supporting the construction of the Chest Pain Center and medical personnel training. These efforts will contribute to the treatment of cardiovascular disease patients in the region.

This event has laid a solid foundation for deep cooperation between China and Antigua and Barbuda in the field of healthcare, helping to enhance Antigua and Barbuda's capacity for the prevention and treatment of cardiovascular diseases, while jointly advancing the construction of a global community of health for all.

Two men arrested and charged for larceny at Valley Church Beach

Police have arrested and jointly charged 24-year-old Damien Henry of Bathlodge and 20-year-old Terry Williams of Nut Grove in connection with a larceny at Valley Church Beach.

Around 1:30 p.m. on Tuesday, December 2, beach security personnel at Valley Church Beach contacted the Bolans Police Station and reported that two visitors had their bag stolen while they were swimming.

It was further reported that a young male stole the visitors' bag and fled the area in an orange Honda Fit motor car.

As a result of a coordinated response between the Bolans Police Station and the Johnson's Point Police Station, the vehicle was intercepted at Johnson's Point with both men onboard. The bag along with its contents, were recovered by police.

Henry and Williams were arrested, taken into custody, and are now formally charged with the offence. They were



scheduled to appear before the court Wednesday to answer to the charge.

Orange Fire, Orange Frame, Orange Strength, Orange Rhymes

Sixteen Days, One Phrase: Protect Her All Ways. Day Ten — December 4th: Teaching Tomorrow Peace

Day Ten dawns like a school bell ringing across Wadadli — a call to the classrooms, the playgrounds, and the dreams of our youth. Today we ask the questions that matter: If violence is learned, can peace be taught? If silence is modeled, can courage be trained? If hurt is inherited, can healing be passed down instead? UN Women tells us plainly: the roots of violence grow early. UNESCO echoes the call: "Education can transform values and replace harmful norms with cultures of respect." This tells us where the battleground lies — not just in courts and clinics, but in classrooms.

In Antigua and Barbuda, our students sit with textbooks on their desks and social expectations on their shoulders. Boys watch how strength is described to them — fists or fairness? Girls learn whether confidence is celebrated or silenced. What lessons are shaping them when the teacher stops talking and the world begins instructing? Violence does not usually begin with blows — it begins with beliefs. Beliefs about power. Beliefs about control. Beliefs about what love should cost. We must interrupt these beliefs with education rooted in empathy.

Teach boys that emotion is not weakness but wisdom. Teach girls that their voice is not insolence but independence. Teach youth that boundaries protect love — they do not hinder it. Many children carry unseen wounds. Homes fractured by conflict.





Phones glowing with cyber harassment. Bodies burdened by silence. They walk into classrooms pretending everything is fine because no one has told them that it's safe not to be okay. The UN Secretary-General reminds us: "Young people are catalysts for cultural change." So why not give them the tools to reshape their future?

Imagine schools where life skills are valued as much as math. Where consent is taught as carefully as reading. Where mental health is protected as fiercely as exam scores. Where reporting abuse is safe and supported. Imagine youth clubs where leadership means service, not dominance. Where sporting fields train teamwork alongside discipline. Where every child — with or without disability — belongs equally and safely.

In Antigua and Barbuda, inclusion must be a pillar of education. Students with disabilities face additional risks of abuse and bullying. Accessible support services, disability-sensitive counsellors, and inclusive teaching strategies become shields of safety. No child should be ashamed of their needs — every need deserves response. But education alone is not enough if homes contradict the lessons. Parents must speak truth. Churches must teach dignity. Coaches must model restraint. Artists must write hope into songs and stories. Communities must reinforce respect.

Day Ten reminds us prevention is preparation. Preparation for peace. Preparation for partnership. Preparation for a nation where violence is history, not habit.

Sixteen days, one purpose: protect our women and girls by planting new roots in our children.





A National Treasure: Celebrating H.E. Sir Lionel Alexander "Max" Hurst, KCN

Birthday Tribute Profile by Aneka Lee December 4th for the past 11 years has been a day of much celebration within the Office of the Prime Minister. This day marks the birth of none other than our Chief of Staff, His Excellency Sir Lionel Hurst. As we celebrate yet another year in the life of our dear Ambassador, we reflect on the life of a man whose service, intellect, and integrity have helped shape Antigua and Barbuda. Diplomat, historian, educator, administrator, mentor and devoted father of 10, Sir Lionel's contributions transcend any single title. His much-deserved knighthood, conferred in recognition of decades of distinguished service, stands as a testament to a career spent advancing the interests and identity of Antigua and Barbuda both at home and on the world stage.

We would not have been able to celebrate Sir Lionel today without the profound act of love and sacrifice by his sister, Ivy Hurst, who donated a kidney to him in November of 2008. This act of love not only extended his life but preserved a great statesman who would go on to make bounteous contributions to Antigua and Barbuda. Sir Lionel, or Sir Max as he jokingly announced is his preferred moniker, is permanently etched into the diplomatic history of our nation. Ambassador Lionel Hurst, a trained lawyer who was called to the bars of New York and Florida, has represented Antigua and Barbuda on the national and international stages with exceptional skill and conviction. As Ambassador to the United States and Permanent Representative to the United Nations he advocated for regional cooperation, international justice, and the developmental priorities of small island states.

A career diplomat, his tenure was not only characterized by its length but also its impact. With great patriotism, he carried the voice of Antigua and Barbuda into global arenas where small nations often struggle to be heard. His eloquence, discipline, and deep understanding of geopolitics made him one of the region's most respected diplomatic figures.

Today, Sir Lionel continues his service as the Chief of Staff in the Office of the Prime Minister, a role in which he continues to demonstrate remarkable skill and insight. With a steady hand, formidable intellect, and institutional memory he serves as invaluable assets to the machinery of government. His function as an advisor and strategist, permits him to remain involved in key national dialogues, assist in developing policy and guide governance with the same measured intelligibility that piloted his years as a diplomat.

Beyond his experience in diplomacy, Sir Lionel is widely regarded as a leading historian, author and intellectual. His writings, including works such as *Democracy by Diplomacy*, illuminate his expansive knowledge of the political evolution of Antigua and Barbuda and preserve the narratives that define us as a people.

Sir Lionel is a true custodian of memory, a guardian of context, and a voice of reason in an era often defined by fleeting information. Should you find yourself in an intellectual quandary Sir Lionel's vast knowledge about a variety of topics will surely leave you satiated. On any given day we, the staff in the Prime Minister's Secretariat, would make queries that could easily be directed at google. However, there is no search engine that would leave us with a more satisfactory response

than consulting with Sir Lionel.

"Unofficially", Sir Lionel also functions as a teacher, communicator and public educator. Sir Lionel possesses a passion for education. From lectures at the public library to public commentary and media engagement, he has tirelessly worked to educate, enlighten, and empower the people of Antigua and Barbuda.

For many, including myself, Sir Lionel has been a personal mentor, a constant source of wisdom, unwavering encouragement, and steady guidance. His mentorship is characterized by patience, respect, and a belief in the potential of others, even when they do not possess that belief in themselves. It is here, in the mentorship of individuals, that his influence becomes deeply personal and enduring.

Sir Lionel's elevation to the rank of Knight Commander of the Most Distinguished Order of the Nation (KCN) was a much deserved and highly fitting way to honour a man who has devoted a lifetime to public service, diplomacy and national development. His knighthood is not simply an award, it reflects the profound respect he has earned from his country and from all those whose lives he has touched, in celebration of his exceptional leadership, his commitment to truth and integrity and tireless advocacy on behalf of Antigua and Barbuda.

On this special day, we not only honour his accomplishments but the character behind them: a gentleman of grace, intellect, humility, and unwavering patriotism. Happy Birthday, Sir Lionel. Jamaican makes Forbes '30 under 30 Finance' list

Kristofer Madu, who has Jamaican and Nigerian heritage, has been named on the Forbes 30 under 30 list for Finance.

At 25 years old, he is a private equity investor and, according to Forbes, focuses on technology, as well as media and entertainment investments at TPG Investments.

The youngster, who was born in the United States to a Jamaican mother, Dr Dainia Baugh, and Nigerian father, Professor Ernest Madu, spent much of his childhood in Jamaica when his family moved back to the country.

This year, Madu was involved in a US\$7.6 billion acquisition of DirecTV from AT&T at TPG.



He previously served as an investment banker at Mor-

gan Stanley's M&A Group, where he is credited with

contributing to deals including Ozempic's US\$17 billion acquisition of Catalent and a US\$10 billion acquisition of Immunogen by AbbVie's, Forbes says.

Aside from releasing music and touring as a rapper, Madu also founded a non-profit called "When We Grow Up".

The organisation says it aims "to provide underserved youth with direct access and early exposure to high-impact, high-paying career paths — like finance, technology, medicine, law, and more".



In a ten-page December 1 letter addressed to Prime Minister Kamla Persad-Bissessar, TTPA President Robert Thompson highlighted the severe impact the ban would have on promoters, performers, and over 60,000 expected attendees, as well as thousands of service providers who rely on these events for their livelihoods.

The ban, announced in November 2025, cited noise pollution concerns and applies to fetes outside a limited permitted window during Carnival 2026. Promoters argue the decision is unfair, coming just weeks before the start of the Carnival season, and could force the cancellation of several major events already licensed and planned for January and February.

According to the Association, Carnival fetes have been hosted at these venues under government approval for

over eight years, with promoters adhering to licensing requirements and Environmental Management Agency (EMA) guidelines. Thompson emphasised that technical solutions, such as acoustic engineering and noise monitoring, could address sound concerns without canceling events.

The TTPA also criticised the lack of timely dialogue with government officials, noting that several scheduled meetings with the Ministry of Culture and the Arts did not occur as planned. The Association has requested an urgent meeting with the Prime Minister and the Minister of Culture and the

India rolls back order to preinstall cybersecurity app on smartphones

ndia's telecoms ministry on Wednesday rolled back its order for smartphone manufacturers to preinstall a government-run cybersecurity app on new devices.

The Ministry of Communications on Monday asked smartphone makers to install the government's "Sanchar Saathi" app within 90 days and to prevent users from disabling it. It also required manufacturers to push the app onto older models through a software update.

Monday's directive led to widespread criticism and concerns of violation of data privacy and user consent in one of the largest handset markets in the world. That order also clashed with policies of companies like U.S.-



based Apple, which prohibits preinstalling third-party apps on its devices, including those developed by governments.

The ministry said in a statement Wednesday that 600,000 new users had reg-


istered to download the app in the last day. While noting its increased acceptance, it said the government "has decided not to make the preinstallation mandatory for mobile manufacturers."

"The app is secure and pure-

ly meant to help citizens from bad actors in the cyberworld. There is no other function other than protecting the users in the app and they can remove the app whenever they want," the statement said.

On Tuesday, India's telecom minister, Jyotiraditya M. Scindia, had called the app voluntary after privacy advocates said it could erode user privacy and consent.

The "Sanchar Saathi" app, which was released in January, was designed to let users block and track lost or stolen phones and to identify and shut down fraudulent mobile connections. Since its launch, it has drawn at least 14 million downloads, according to government data. (AP)

Search for long-missing Malaysia Airlines flight MH370 to resume



The search for the wreckage of Malaysia Airlines flight MH370 will resume on 30 December, over a decade after the aircraft with 239 people on board vanished, Malaysian authorities have said.

This fresh search, which will run for 55 days, had begun in March but was suspended shortly after because of poor weather conditions.

"The latest development underscores the [Malaysia's] commitment to providing closure to the families affected by this tragedy," the transport ministry said Wednesday, according to local media.

Flight MH370, a Boeing 777, disappeared in 2014 while travelling

from Kuala Lumpur to Beijing and sparked the largest search in aviation history.

Exploration firm Ocean Infinity is leading the current search under a "no find, no fee" arrangement. It will receive \$70m (£56m) if the wreckage is found, Transport Minister Loke Siew Fook earlier said.

Previous attempts include a multinational search involving 60 ships and 50 aircraft from 26 countries, which ended in 2017, and a 2018 effort by Ocean Infinity ended after three months.

Flight MH370 lost contact with air traffic control less than an hour after take-off on 8 March 2014, and radar showed it had deviated from its original flight path.

It remains one of the greatest aviation mysteries, which continues to haunt the families of those on board. Over the years, many had called for a new search, noting their struggle to find closure.

The incident has also given rise to a host of conspiracy theories, including speculation that the pilot had deliberately brought the plane down or that it had been hijacked.

An investigation in 2018 found that the plane's controls were likely deliberately manipulated to take it off course, but drew no conclusions behind it.

Investigators said at the time that "the answer can only be conclusive if the wreckage is found". (BBC)

DNA connects Colorado woman's murder to 'prolific serial killer' 40 years later, officials say

DNA from a "prolific serial killer" discovered on a pair of paper bags has led to a Colorado woman murder being solved nearly 40 years later, according to officials.

Rhonda Marie Fisher, 30, was found sexually assaulted and strangled to death alongside a rural highway roughly 35 miles south of Denver on April 1, 1987, according to authorities.

The Douglas County Sheriff's Office said in a news release on Tuesday that after decades of investigating, officials connected her DNA, found on a pair of paper bags, to one of the state's "most prolific serial killers."

"Obtaining a viable DNA profile from paper bags nearly four decades old is exceptionally rare and underscores the extraordinary value of meticulous evidence preservation and periodic forensic reevaluation," the sheriff's office said in the release.

Fisher was last seen the night before she died in Denver, about an hour's drive north of where her body was found, authorities said. In the weeks leading up to her murder, Fisher was staying with various acquaintances, authorities said. One person



became a person of interest early in the case but was ultimately cleared, according to the sheriff's office.

Detectives also failed to investigate multiple serial offenders in the Denver metropolitan area from the 1970s and 1990s, officials said. Even after renewed DNA testing in 2017, "no complete DNA profiles were produced to identify the perpetrator," according to the release.

This year, the sheriff's office's cold case unit reopened her investigation. And in October, investigators matched DNA recovered from paper bags placed on Fisher's hands, used to preserve trace evidence, with biological evidence from three homicides committed in 1979 by Vincent Darrell Groves, according to the release.

Officials referred to Groves as "one of Colorado's most prolific serial killers." The sheriff's office said he was convicted of murder in 1982 and was involved in sex trafficking and drug distribution. He served less than five years for his murder conviction

and went on to commit attacks that "primarily targeted vulnerable women," officials said.

Groves is believed responsible for at least 12 homicides, an attempted murder, and a sexual assault in the Denver metro area, the sheriff's office said, adding that his "true number of victims is likely higher." He died in 1996 while in Colorado Department of Corrections custody after convictions related to the 1988 murders of Diann Mancera in Douglas County and another victim in Adams County, the news release stated.

"While Vincent Groves cannot be held accountable in a court of law, we hope this long-awaited resolution brings answers and a measure of peace to Rhonda Fisher's family and friends," Douglas County Sheriff Darren Weekly said in a statement. "This case is a testament to our commitment to pursue justice for every victim—no matter how much time has passed."

Weekly added that Fisher was a mother, daughter, sister, and friend, and that her case exemplifies the need "to bring closure to families who have endured unimaginable waits." (NBC)



New Zealand seize control of opening Test against Windies

CHRISTCHURCH (Reuters) - Seamer Jacob Duffy claimed a maiden five-wicket haul to secure New Zealand a handy first innings lead, and the upper hand in the opening Test against the West Indies at Christchurch's Hagley Oval on Wednesday.

Duffy claimed five for 34 to help bundle out the West Indies for 167 in a spectacular collapse from 100 for two at one stage.

Opener Tagenarine Chanderpaul and Shai Hope made half-centuries in their otherwise feeble reply to New Zealand's first innings total of 231.

New Zealand finished a stop-start Day 2 on 32 for no loss, for an overall lead of 96 runs.

Tom Latham (14) and Devon Con-

way (15) will come out on Thursday hoping to bat the West Indies out of the contest.

Earlier, New Zealand took two early wickets when the track looked lively but Hope and Chanderpaul, who struck a patient 52, put on 90 for the third wicket.

Hope fell caught behind off a Duffy short ball for 56 and Matt Henry, who captured three for 43, drove home the advantage by removing touring captain Roston Chase (0) and Justin Greaves (0) in the space of four deliveries.

Chanderpaul did not look convincing at the start and was dropped twice but he dug in, found his rhythm, and raised a hard-earned fifty.

His marathon 169-ball stay finally

ended on a pull off Zak Foulkes that did not get past square. An airborne Devon Conway took a stunning catch to make amends for an earlier drop.

When play resumed after a rain break, Duffy sent down a two-wicket maiden over to rattle West Indies and removed Jayden Seales (2) and Ojay Shields (0) to hasten their collapse.

"Obviously, they got a bit of a partnership going, we knew they would at some stage, and it coincided with the ball stopping swinging," all-rounder Foulkes said afterwards.

"Duff has taken on that enforcer role, which is awesome. It's great to see. And then we actually saw it swing again at the end, which was interesting."

Serena Williams denies pending return to pro tennis

TORONTO (Reuters) - Serena Williams has re-entered the tennis anti-doping testing pool but the 23-times Grand Slam champion denied on Tuesday that the move had anything to do with her making a return to the sport she dominated for nearly two decades.

The International Tennis Integrity Agency confirmed to Reuters that Williams, who has not competed since the 2022 US Open, was among the list of players in its testing pool, which requires individuals to provide their whereabouts at any given time, every day, and participate in random testing.

But as the story of 44-year-old Williams' inclusion on the list, first reported earlier on Tuesday by The Athletic, gained traction and sparked talk about her potential return, the tennis great took to social media to deny a comeback was in her plans.

"Omg yall I'm NOT coming back. This wildfire is crazy," Williams wrote on X.

Her agent did not immediately respond to an email from Reuters asking why the player had re-entered the testing pool.

Williams' name appears on the ITIA website's list of retired players and would be able to return to a sanctioned event after making herself available for out-of-competition testing for at least six months.

Last week former world number one Williams posted a series of photos on Instagram showing

herself on a tennis court with her youngest daughter, Adira River, whom she gave birth to in August 2023.

In August 2022, ahead of her final US Open, Williams announced in a Vogue article that she was "evolving away from tennis."

Williams, who won her last Grand Slam singles title in 2017, had been chasing an elusive 24th crown that would have drawn her level with Australian Margaret Court, who holds the record.

The American came tantalisingly close to achieving that feat, featuring in four major finals since giving birth to her first daughter, Olympia, in 2017.
